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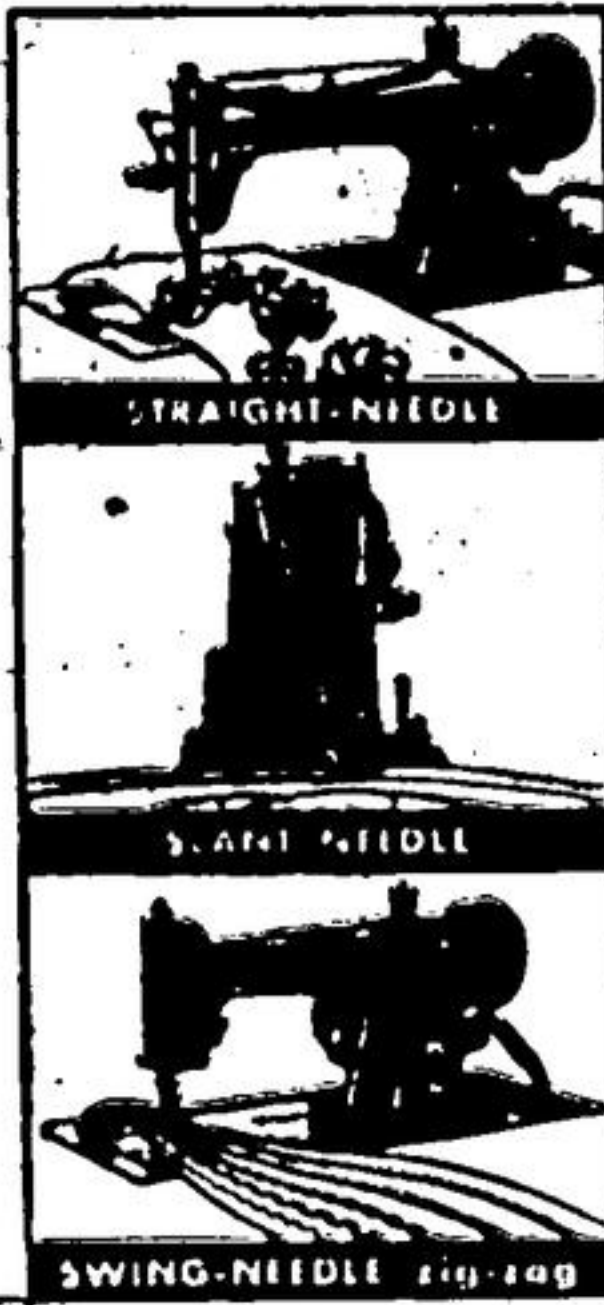

AT ESQUESING COUNCIL

Esquesing Will Restrict Use of Cabin Trailers

Regulations for use of cabin trailers as dwellings, are contained in legislation passed by Esquesing Council at their April meeting. The by-law has been forwarded to the Municipal Board which must give approval before it becomes law. Strict regulations govern use of trailers for any purpose other than temporary accommodation while a house is being built. If a person is building a home, he is granted the right to use a trailer for a period up to a year, with no fee being charged.

For transient dwellers, trailers cannot be used on any property without first securing a township license at a cost of \$25 which is valid for 60 days. At the township's discretion this license can be renewed for a further 60 days on payment of another \$25 fee. It is only renewable once.

The by-law also provides restrictions against parking trailers on public road allowance for a longer period than 48 hours. Penalties up to \$50 are provided for infractions of the by-law.

Council made a grant of \$150 towards a fund being collected for suitable recognition of Norval Juniors as champions of the county junior farmer hockey league this year.

The salary of the assessment commissioner Arthur Benton was adjusted. Mr. Benton will now receive a salary of \$2600 plus car allowance of \$700.

A by-law was passed officially appointing K. C. Lindsay as clerk treasurer and tax collector. Mr. Lindsay succeeds I. M. Bennett, clerk for many years, who resigned the position recently.

Reservé Wilfrid Bird was appointed Esquesing's representative to a meeting of municipalities in the Credit River watershed, which met last week to discuss formation of a conservation authority.

A total of \$51 was paid in county fox claims which allows \$3 for each fox destroyed. Payments were to Mel Whitney, \$15; John Verlis, Norval, \$9; Harold Campbell, Georgetown and Gordon Barnes, Norval, \$6 each; and \$3 each to Jack Burton, Norval, Edward Robertson of Horony, Clifford Holt, Georgetown, Wilmer Watkins, Acton and William Newman, Streetsville.

Accounts included - H. A. Lever, audit fee, \$400; Town of Milton, \$150 for 3 fire area calls; Town of Georgetown, \$200 for 4 fire area calls; Daymond Home Furnishings, \$224 for council chamber chairs.

COUNTY GRANTS \$2100 FOR BLIND BUILDING

Halton County has made a 1954 grant of \$2,100 to the Canadian National Institute for the Blind, announces L. D. Maxwell, county chairman of the Institute's Building Fund.

The \$3,156,000 Building Fund will finance a rehabilitation centre for the more than 2,000 blind persons in Halton, Ontario, Peel, Simcoe and York counties, and the District of Muskoka.

There are 33 blind residents in Halton county who will be using the services of the new rehabilitation centre. The centre, to be the world's most efficient, will be built in North York Township, near Sunnybrook Hospital.

Halton County's generous support of the Building Fund is concrete evidence that the people of the county recognize the need for improved general services for the blind, Mr. Maxwell said.

The county chairman added, "The \$2,100 grant will set a high standard of giving for the entire county and will act as inspiration to all voluntary workers."

Entertaining Evening At Puppet Performance
