Seventy-five girls, through the winter months, have been working on the project "Being Well Dressed and Well Groomed," and on Saturday came in from all over the county to demonstrate what they had learned and to receive recognition for their accomplishments.

Under the chairmanship of Mrs. Mabel Borgstrom, County Home Economist for the Department of Agriculture, the program began at 9:30 in the morning with the introduction of clubs and their leaders and then the activities commenced. Each member was required to prepare a sample of darning from materials provided, and

to judge a class of white cotton slips and a dress parade. The latter was quite a treat for club members for the Home Economists acted as models in the parade and it was the girls' privilege to criticize their clothing, grooming, posture, etc.

In the afternoon the situation was reversed when the Clubs provided the program and were criticized by visiting Home Economists, Miss Flora Durbin of Grey, Dufferin and Wellington counties, Miss Florence Arnold of Kent, Essex and Lambton; and Mrs. Marion Montgomery, of Toronto.
