Donald Ross Platt, former manager of the Bank of Nova Scotia in London died April 12 at University Hospital, Cleveland, Ohio. Mr. Piett was manager of the main branch, London for fourteen years and had been brench manager in Wellington, Mericham, Cobalt, Picton and Peterboro. He was with the bank for forty six years, retiring in 1951. 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
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
