Recommend Night School Under High School Board

The following resolution, passed at a recent meeting of the Halton Night School Planning Board, will be of interest to many Halton folk who have been participating in Halton's rural community night school programme over the past four years:

WHEREAS Rural Community Night School classes have been conducted with outstanding success for a period of four years in Milton and one year at both Acton and Georgetown and WHEREAS under the policy governing Rural Community Night Schools, only one Night School may be held in a county in any one year and for a period of two years only at any one centre, except under special circumstances, and WHEREAS Milton is the logical centre if such classes are to serve rural Halton and WHEREAS a similar programme could be offered under the North Halton High School Area Board, with classes at Acton, Georgetown and Milton, therefore be it resolved that we the members of the Halton Night School Planning Board request the members of the North Halton High School Area Board to give consideration to the organization and conducting of Night School Classes at Acton, Georgetown and Milton during the season 1954-1955, so that there need be no lapse in this excellent program of adult education.
