

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

Junior Dairy Club Unique in Province

Two years ago sixteen Halton Junior Farmers enrolled in a new project known as a Junior Datry Herdamens Project To date this is the only group organized in the province they acted as a guinea pig group to try out the idea During the two years the young men attended twenty or more lectures from some of the top staff of the Ontario Department of Agriculture in Guelph and Toronto. 
