### WHAT COUNCIL DID

#### Will Call Tenders for Town Debentures

Tenders will soon be called for debentures totalling \$24,250 for a number of water and sewer extensions and \$46,175 for the new fire hall. There is another \$9500 debenture pending for sewers in the Tyers subdivision which has not yet been approved by the Municipal Board.

An extra 400 feet of wooden fence will be built around the track in the park. Cecil Smith was given the contract at an approximate price of \$300.

Suggestion by Cr. Gray that the Mgt.-Church corner be restricted with "No U turn" was not acted upon.

When Reeve Allen suggested that use of water meters in houses be abandoned, it was decided first to prepare figures to see what financial revenue is derived by extra water sale, and to have engineer Roberts, who originally recommended the meters, give his thoughts on the matter.

Advised that loopholes in the building by-law might lead to infringements of the intention of the by-law, council appointed a committee to recommend by-law changes which will close such loopholes.

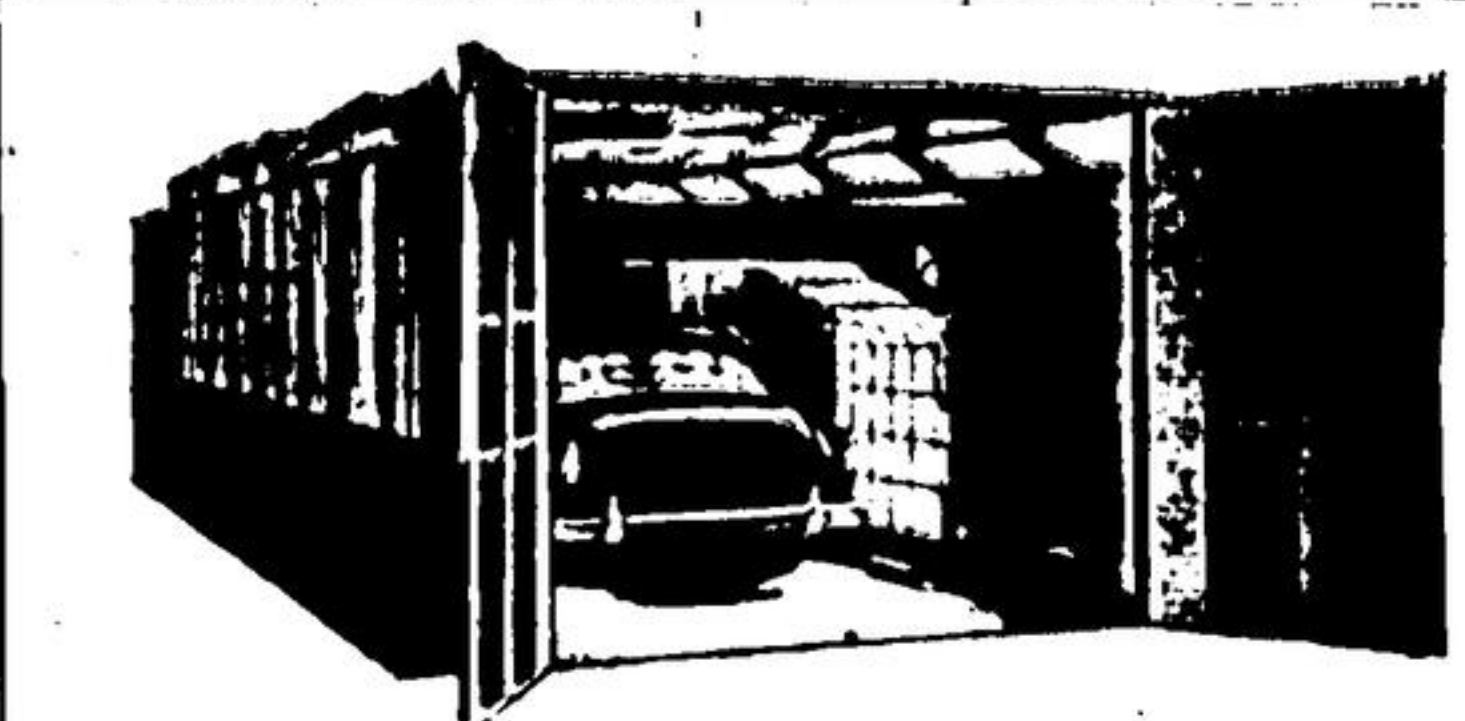

### FARM NEWS

#### Junior Dairy Club Unique in Province

Two years ago sixteen Halton Junior Farmers enrolled in a new project known as a Junior Dairy Herdman's Project. To date this is the only group organized in the province. They acted as a guided pig group to try out the idea. During the two years the young men attended twenty or more lectures from some of the top staff of the Ontario Department of Agriculture in Guelph and Toronto. They also enjoyed a day at Agricultural and Veterinary Colleges, and visited at least one top dairy farm. They have received instructions from leading authorities on such subjects as feeds and feeding, animal breeding, breeding problems and records, stable renovation, milk houses, disease prevention and control, labour saving studies, milk sanitation, etc., etc.

Judging by the comments heard to date from those participating, and from some of their fathers, it has been one of the most worthwhile projects ever initiated for senior junior farmers. Eleven of the young men completed this two year project, the final session being held on Friday evening when Prof. Art Robertson of the Farm Economics Branch at Guelph, discussed Farm Finances. In recognition of their effort, the young men will be guests at the Ontario Department of Agriculture at a special dinner to be held at the Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph, on May 12th. 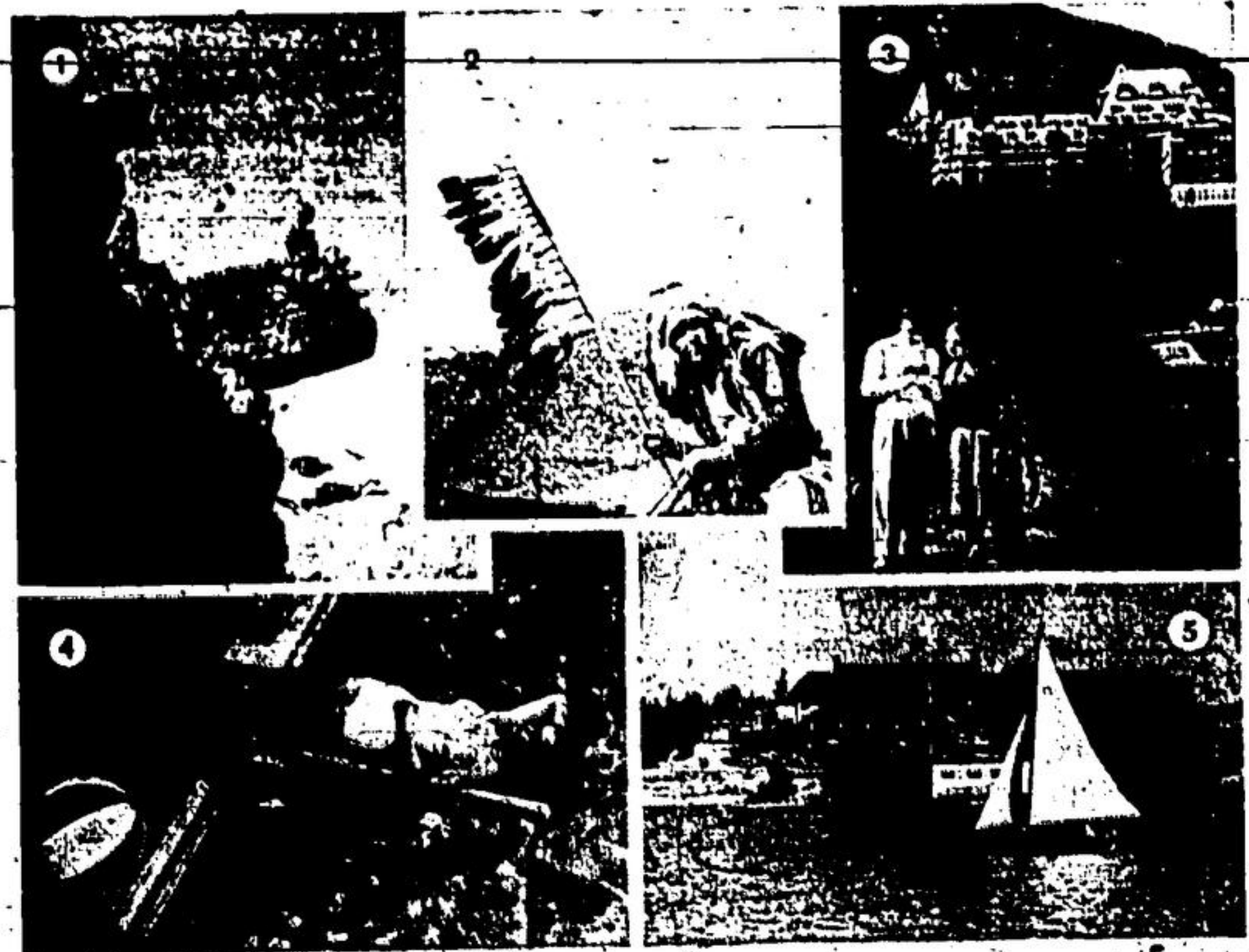
