The fifth annual school for Rural Clergy at the Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph, will be held from July 26th to 30th, 1954. It will be attended by clergymen and their wives of all denominations from

The program is planned to provide a pleasant and stimulating atmosphere for the discussion of the problems of the rural comunity and to give the clergyman a further knowledge of agriculture in relation to human welfare.

It will offer a choice of three courses: a course in Rural Sociology conducted by Dr. N. H. High, director of the Diploma Course; a course in "The Business of Farming," a study of the important role. of agriculture in the Canadian Economy, by Prof. D. R. Campbell, head of the Department of Agricultural Economics; and a course in Human Relations and Canadian Litsersture, by Prof. G. E. Reaman, Head of the English Department.

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
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
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
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
