

**NEW CHOIR GOWNS AT ST. JOHN'S CHURCH**

The service on Sunday morning at St. John's United Church was very appropriate to the special occasion, the dedication of the new gowns of both senior and junior choirs, and the reconsecration of the choir to the great service they render to God's Church and His Kingdom.

Rev. John M. Smith's theme for the service was: "The ministry of music and his text from Psalm 98. 'O sing unto the Lord a new song, for he hath done marvellous things: his right hand and His Holy arm hath gotten him the Victory.'"

Mr. Smith told of a small rural church in Wales, where the organist, through other commitments, could not always be present when the service was about to begin. If the organist was not present an old shepherd would come forward and with his tuning fork strike the key and lead the congregation in the service of praise. A small incident maybe, but to Mr. Smith it brought the fact that we had a singing religion, probably more definitely so than any other, and a very natural expression of what our religion has done for us. It springs from the hope which our knowledge of God and His Christ, has brought into our lives, from the promise of life more abundant and eternal, with love the happy motive of our actions, rather than selfishness, for the courage to bear and persevere which it gives us, the thought for others and inspiration to nobler living, all making for happiness and an expression in hymn and song.

And we can go back a long way and know that in earliest times, God's people used song and music as their means of giving thanks and praise to Him for the many marvelous things He did for them, and the many victories He gave them. And then down through the Psalmist's days the people were led into the same spirit: "O Come let us sing unto the Lord, let us make a joyful noise to the rock of our salvation."

And the early Christians voiced their new found hope, given them that first Easter, in an outburst of praise and thanksgiving. And now we have all the benefits of our beautiful hymns, written from some deep Christian experience of a devoted follower, put to music often by one who felt the experience fitted his life, as it so often fits ours, and we can put our feelings, our hope, our thanksgiving and praise even our sorrow and repentance into song or hymn. "O God Our Help in Ages Past," "The King of Love my Shepherd is" and so many which fit into the deep places of our lives.

And the place of the choir in this. Theirs is the responsibility and privilege of leading us in our desire to sing our worship and praise, to give to us a new song we can sing to our Lord, not just from our lips, but from our heart and soul. And to do this sincerely and faithfully, they should know, not only the song, but also know the God, the Saviour, the Shepherd of the song.

And further, they must have the response of the people, the full giving from the heart, not just the song, but the praise and love, the joy and thanksgiving springing from the fountains of our belief and trust in a loving heavenly Father who seeks the highest and best for all His creatures, a true brotherhood under a kindly God.

Mr. Smith during the service, dedicated the gowns of both choirs, "to the worship of God and His glory," and asked the members of the choirs to reconsecrate themselves to their high service of praise, and also asked the congregation to give their whole hearted response to the leading of the choirs in this act of worship.

The senior choir sang the appropriate anthem: "Let Mount Zion Rejoice," with Mrs. Jack Bailey and Reg. Broomhead taking the solo parts, and Miss Ruth Evans sang: "How Lovely Are Thy Dwellings." Eighteen Junior Worshipers were presented with their second year wreaths, to be attached to their first year plus.

The In Memoriam flowers were placed to the memory of Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Erwin, by their daughters; and those in the Memorial Room to the memory of Mrs. A. Ostrander.

For the evening service Mr. Smith chose another Old Testament parable or story for his meditation, the Bible story of Abraham pleading with God to spare Sodom and Gomorrah if 50 righteous persons could be found therein, and continued pleading until God promised not to destroy the cities even if 10 righteous were found there. God is considerate, ever merciful ready to spare, yet always anxious that at least a remnant of his people should remain truly faithful. He told Isaiah of His leading of this remnant in Israel that they might be the means of saving the nation. And He has always had a faithful few, down through the ages, else would the earth have perished, — just as the gleanings — a small remnant, of the wheat and grain fields, vine and fig trees, left by law in the olden days, saved the poor from hunger and starvation. This remnant of God's people has generally been few in numbers but of high quality, always ready and willing

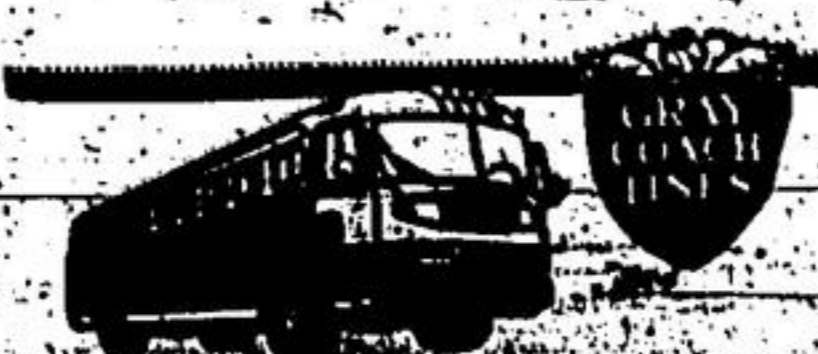

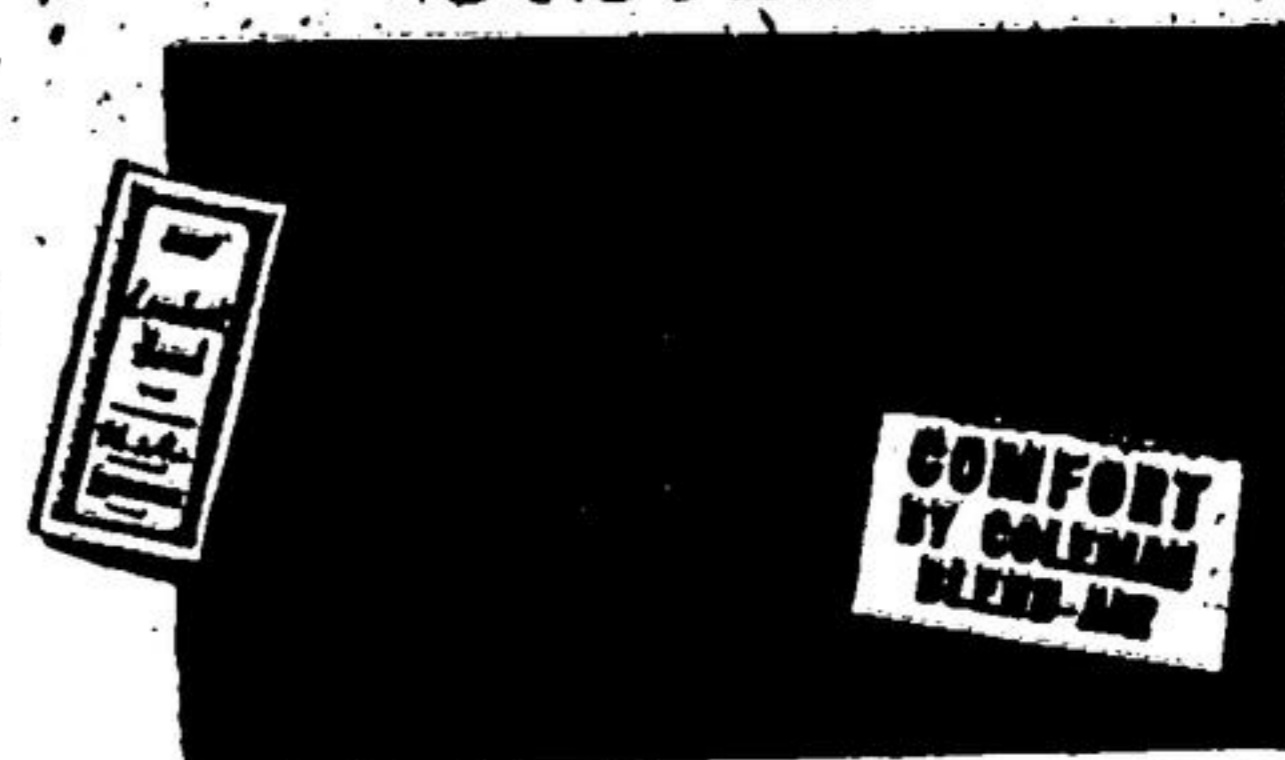
