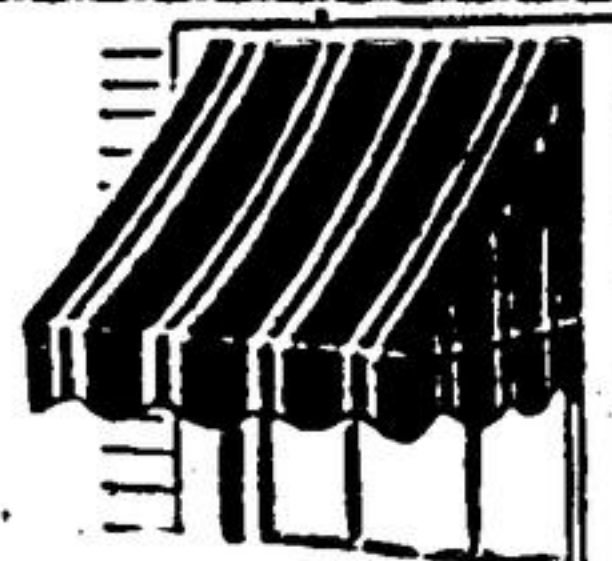
Milton Junior Farmers are the local sponsoring organization, but members of the tractor club need not be members of the Junior Farmers Club.
