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


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INDEXES SHOW IMPLEMENT PRICES AT LOW LEVEL OF INCREASE

That implement prices have been kept at a low level is clearly shown by the comparison of Dominion Bureau of Statistics index figures, which give an increase in "all commodities" since 1941 of 82.1% as against an increase in a comparable index for Massey-Harris implements of only 66.9%. This low percentage of increase, too, is shown in the face of an increase in the index figure for materials of 94.7% and of Massey-Harris hourly rates of pay of 173.9% as can be seen by

referring to the chart shown above. Also, the indexes show that while farm implements have only increased 66.9% there has been an increase in the price of farm products of 82.6% and the scarcity of farm labour has caused farm wage rates to increase by 177.6%.

Farmers depend upon mechanization to offset the scarcity and high cost of labour and the indexes show that prices of such equipment have been maintained at a comparatively low level of increase. Farm equipment with its time and labour saving advantages offers exceptional value for the money.
