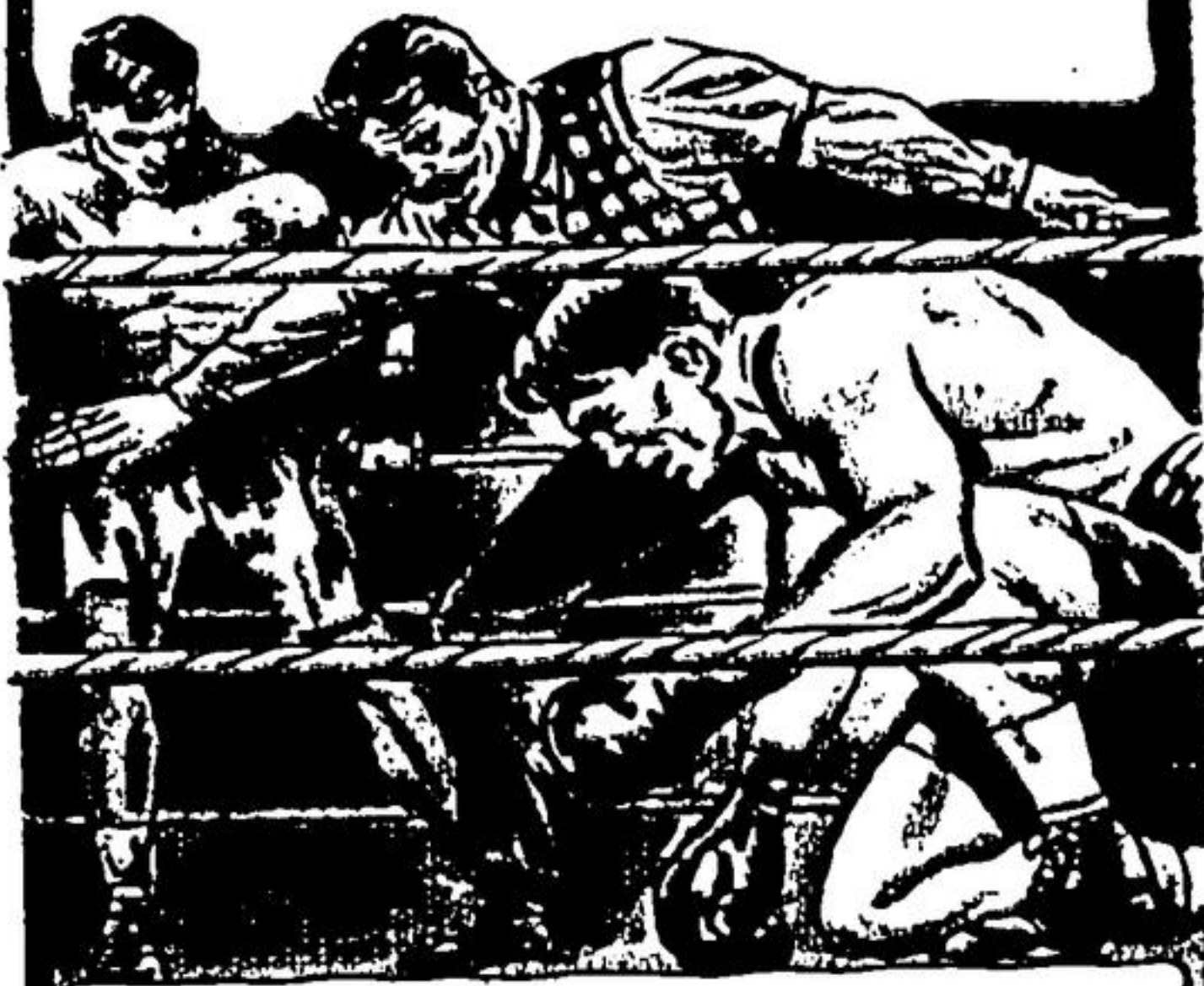

## County Topped Canada TB Xmas Seal Campaign

"Tuberculosis is not a killer, but an infectious disease which can be effectively treated and cured," declared Dr. S. J. Hawkins, superintendent of Freeport Sanatorium, before the Halton TB and Health Association annual meeting audience of over 60 persons who earlier learned Halton held the highest per capita record of donations in Canada during the 1953 Christmas Seal campaign.

County organizations, of which the Halton group is one, carry out action from the Ontario TB Association, which in turn represents the thinking of the county associations. Dr. Hawkins told his hearers at the meeting in Trafalgar township hall.

Congratulating the successes of the Halton association, the president of the Ontario TB Association said the group had budgeted well and added emphasis to the importance of work in the field. Dr. Hawkins challenged the organizations represented to aid in their own county the effective educational program, designed for TB prevention.

Following the introduction of head table guests by the Halton Association president, H. C. Morris, Oakville, Mrs. M. E. Lunan, Oakville, delivered the 1953 secretary's report, characterized by record breaking figures. With the average donation in the recent campaign reckoned at \$2.88, Mrs. Lunan revealed, the sale receipts of \$14,063.99 figured a return of \$1.19 per letter sent.

After itemizing some of the advances made through acquisition of equipment and extension of facilities, Mrs. Lunan termed the past year the most successful in the Association's history.

Dr. A. Bull, Halton M.O.H. and TB association director, termed TB as an "aggressor which has been existing for 3,500 years." Referring to the progress in the battle against this aggressor, the speaker specified figures which prove preventative action has reduced TB's annual death toll at an amazing rate.

This progress, he continued stems from the co-operation and enthusiasm of all the agencies and organizations in the fight against TB. "For that matter," Dr. Bull summarized, "everyone who buys TB seals is in the fight."

R. F. Bean, Acton, Association Education director and later named president for 1954, described the educational projects carried on by the Association. Mr. Bean urged that the representatives present "tell their story" to their own groups. Effective prevention increases with the knowledge and consciousness that TB can be cured, Mr. Bean asserted.

Public relations manager for the Ford Motor Co. at Oakville, William Dagleish stated his company was prepared to lend its facilities take a part in the preventive work. Mr. Dagleish hoped a continuous process of education might be devised so that next Christmas the Seal Sale campaign "will be no surprise to anybody."

"TB is everybody's business," exclaimed the next speaker, E. J. O'Brien, executive secretary of the Ontario Association. He assured the audience that all laymen can take a part in the preventive work. The Halton Association is your vehicle, he explained, to do something about the eradication of TB.

After reminding the group of the great drain on productivity and loss of man hours caused by TB convalescents, Mr. O'Brien emphasized that TB is not only the doctors' business but is everybody's business.

Dr. L. Helling, of the Department of Health, warned against a complacency creeping out of the optimism from recent progress. He urged there be no let up in the work of prevention and called for vigorous exploitation of all known prevention facilities in the county.

Appreciation for assistance and support from Halton to Mountain Sanatorium was expressed by Dr. J. Lee. He told of the encouraging statistics revealed about the life expectancy of cured TB patients. According to insurance companies survey in the United States, he said, a person living 10 years after a TB condition has been arrested may expect to live as long or longer than one who has never contracted the infection.

IF YOU HOLD Third Victory Loan 3% Bonds (issued November, 1942 to mature November, 1956) they should be presented for payment on or after June 1st through any branch bank in Canada. AFTER THIS DATE NO FURTHER INTEREST WILL BE PAID. The interest coupon dated November 1st, 1954 and all coupons dated later than this must be attached to the bonds when they are presented for payment. Payment will be \$101.26 for a \$100 bond (and for other denominations accordingly). This payment includes a \$1 premium as required by the terms of the bond—plus 26¢ which is interest at 3% from May 1st to June 1st—the period since the last coupon became payable.
