Ardent Churchman John Bird Dies

Eldest of the family of Joseph Bird and Sarah Ann Noble, John Bird, 86, died at his home at Stewarttown on May 8th.

He was born in Gablesby, Cumberland, England, and as a young child came to Norval where his parents settled. There he and his brother were farmers and later for a number of years, he was postmaster at Norval Station. Afterwards, he moved to Stewarttown where he farmed until his health failed recently.

Mr. Bird was an ardent churchman, serving in St. Paul's Church, Norval, and St. John's, Stewarttown as teacher, Sunday School superintendent, church warden and choir member. To all who knew him he was an example of Christian living, dealing justly, loving mercy and walking humbly with his God. He is survived by his wife Etta Ann McLean, whom he married in 1901, a sister Margaret of Dundas and three brothers, Thomas, Georgetown, William, of Pine Falls, Manitoba and James of Niagara Falls. A brother Joseph and two sisters, Mrs. John Silngby and Mrs. James Fiddler predeceased him.

The funeral took place in St. Paul's Church, Norval on May 8th with Rev. J. E. Maxwell, assisted by Rev. R. Coupland conducting the service. Interment was in Hillcrest Cemetery, Norval. Pallbearers were Sidney Morris, Warwick Coupland, Francis Thompson, Ross Thompson, Frank Ruddle and Joseph Standish.

FARM NEWS

Thomas Bradley is New Weed Inspector

Recently we had a chat with Thomas Bradley, Halton's new county weed inspector. Mr. Bradley, along with a number of municipal officials from the county, attended the Weed Conference at the Ontario Agricultural College. It was pointed out at the Conference, that as a result of research since 1927, it has been established that the most effective time to kill most weed infestations is in the month of May, and early June. It has also been established, states Mr. Bradley, that the most economical and efficient method of killing weeds is by spraying.

We were somewhat surprised to learn from Mr. Bradley that no less than 200,000 folk in Ontario are effected by hay fever — in most cases caused by the pollen from weeds. No one likes weeds — in the first place, they are unsightly — they are a factor in lowering moisture supplies and lowering the fertility level. Consequently they reduce crop yields and lower the quality and value of our crops. To all these sins must be added the effect on the health of our human population. It was no surprise to learn from Mr. Bradley, that it is the intention of those charged with the responsibility of weed control, to do a better job in 1954.

Education Needed

While the Ontario Weed Control Act provides Weed Inspectors with complete authority to have weeds destroyed and the cost of the same charged to property owners as taxes, or the alternative of court action, most citizens agree that such measures do not kill weeds nor solve weed problems. In short, stated Mr. Bradley, in the final analysis, education is the most effective remedy. To this end he hopes to secure the cooperation of the property owners, members of municipal councils, road superintendents and citizens generally, in taking action immediately to prevent the unsightly messes of former years.

Indiana Roadside Clean

We were also interested to learn from A. R. Coulter, of Louisville, who recently returned from a trip to the state of Indiana, that down there the farms and the roadides are clean and tidy in comparison to ours here in Ontario. All of their farm buildings are painted, most of them white, stated Mr. Coulter, who was most enthusiastic in his praise of the general tidiness of the farmsteads, including freedom from weeds. Surely what they can do in Indiana we can do in Ontario and more particularly in Halton County. As we see it, it means co-operative effort, so if you receive a call from our new county weed inspector just remember he is there not primarily to lay down the law or, haul you into court, but to help you get some of the weeds under control. As we intimated in a former article, "Home wasn't built in a day," so we can't expect to eliminate our weed problem in a year — it is going to take time but let us make 1954 remembered as the year Halton really made a start in eliminating weeds which at the present time are costing us millions of dollars annually, and also endangering the health of our citizens.
