**SEEDING IN HALTON IS
ALMOST COMPLETED**

Thanks to the fine weather 90 to 95 per cent of the cereal grain crop was in the ground at the end of last week. Some grain corn has been planted and preparation of land for the silage corn crop was under way. The cold nights and generally low temperature of last week retarded growth of meadows and pastures. Despite the fact that the new seedlings and established meadows came through the winter in top condition, it is going to take some warm showers and higher temperatures to produce a normal crop of hay, judging by the condition of the meadows at the week-end.

Livestock men have most of their cattle on pasture which cut down to some extent on chores and enabled the tractors to roll longer hours and complete the seeding.
