Scientific Instrument
Charts Human Blood Flow
 The newest scientific instrument is a machine which photographs the flow of blood through the human circulatory system.
 Called a "seriagraph," it is actually an X-ray machine, which takes pictures as rapidly as every half-second although it can be set for lower speeds.
 The seriagraph is most valuable to the brain surgeon. It can be used for other parts of the blood system, but is especially valuable for locating brain tumors, cerebral hemorrhages, atrophies, and other kinds of pathological deteriorations.
 Principal parts of the apparatus are the rotating anode tube, which projects the x-ray, and a Fairfield aerial camera which records the pictures on a roll of film.
 A patient brought in for observation of a suspected brain tumor is placed on a table, under an anesthetic, with his head immobilized between the tube and the camera. A radiopaque substance, either a thorium or an iodine dye, is injected into the artery in the neck with a syringe.
 During the six seconds it takes for the dye to travel through the arteries, capillaries and veins of the brain, and again the camera makes its pictures. If there is a tumor, the pictures will show where the flow of dye was blocked.

Army Needs All-Purpose Rubber For Operations
 American chemists, who engineered the synthetic rubber miracle during World War II, must now provide the army with rubber equipment which will withstand all weather conditions from tropical sunlight to Arctic cold.
 Because it is not possible to earmark rubber items for use under a given set of climatic conditions, all equipment must be designed for successful operation from 65 degrees below zero to 130 degrees above.
 Items intended for tropical use might encounter temperatures below freezing during airborne transit, indicating that the Army needs rubber items which, when out of use, can be stored at temperatures from minus 80 to plus 160 degrees. Even greater extremes than this have been experienced.
 Four low-styrene modifications of the standard GR-S synthetic rubber — two of them made by the "cold rubber" process — or blends of them — fulfill the requirements for non-oil-resistant rubber for military purposes. The use of these types of rubber would also tend to relieve the nation's critical shortage of styrene.

Students Getting Better
 The average age of the freshman dental student is dropping and his grades for pre-dental studies are getting higher, it was reported by the Council on Dental Education of the American Dental Association. More than 81 per cent of the 3,070 freshmen in the last year's class had a grade of B minus or better in pre-dental studies as compared with 44.5 per cent in the post-war class of 1946, the report showed. According to the study, reported in the Journal of the American Dental Association, last year's new class was also noted for its youth. More than 62 per cent of last year's group were under 24 years of age as compared with only 13 per cent of the 1947 class.

The Question of Iron
 The American Iron and Steel Institute reports that the United States has access to an estimated iron ore reserve of 8,096,000,000 gross tons, including deposits as far away as Brazil, Venezuela and Labrador. Estimated ore reserves available to Russia amount to 6,080,000,000 gross tons and include only those deposits behind the iron curtain. The institute notes — in the interest of complete clarity — that the iron curtain, itself, is not included among Russia's iron ore reserves.

Remarkable Record
 Dade County, Florida, of which Miami is the government seat, has a population of 489,830 and sold 220,064 automobiles in 1950. In 1949, Dade County tailed Nassau County New York and Genesee County, Mich. In Nassau there was a car for each 1.8 family or 2.8 persons; in Genesee for each .9 family or 3.1 persons. Dade County had a car for each 1.0 family or 3.3 persons in 1949.

Aid to Beauty
