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### Major Bill Hardman Gets Top Cadet Award

Georgetown High School's cadet squad, a highly trained group of students who last year stood high among similar groups in Ontario, again staged a fine demonstration in the park last Tuesday.

Lt.-Col. John R. Barber, commanding officer of the Lorne Scots and Lieut. Smith from Oakville army headquarters were inspecting officers and the Lorne Scots Band played for the march past and during some of the drill work.

The display was under the leadership of Capt. Alan Prouse of the school staff with assistance from Major Paul Barber, Lieut. Allan Teeter and other members of the Lorne Scots. Top award of the evening was the Col. Barber trophy, won this year by Cadet Major Bill Hardman, with cups also awarded to Danny Martin and Doug Wrigglesworth who stood next in order among the boys and a medal to Don Seddon, fourth in the standing. Best girl cadet Pat Carney won a medal and plaque. Dorothy Scott, who was not only the best rifle shot among girls but was seventh highest in standing in the whole corps, won a medal.

### Session Members Will Conduct Church Service

Regular morning worship was conducted in St. John's United Church on Sunday by the minister, Rev. John M. Smith who had as his sermon topic "When a Man Turns From God." The scripture was read from Isaiah 55 and John 3. Mr. Smith pointed out that the Bible tells of the great revelation of God to man, of man's response to that revelation, and of man's tendency to turn away from God and to live a life of his own choosing. There are certain tendencies to be noted in this process of turning away from God, namely, man loses sight of the reality of God, man minimizes the fact of sin, and man elevates himself almost to the point of deification. While the Bible declares that man has "turned everyone to his own way" it also declares that man need not stay in his wayward condition and estranged from God and His purpose. This is the good news of the New Testament — man can be reconciled to God through Jesus Christ.

The choir sang the anthem: "Lift Up Your Heads, O Ye Gates." It was announced that the worship next Sunday would be conducted by members of Session in the absence of the minister who will be attending the Hamilton Conference.

#### SOIL, CROP GROUP SPONSORS BUS TOUR

Bus tours sponsored by the Halton Soil and Crop Improvement Association in former years have been so popular that in answer to the popular demand arrangements have been made for a one day event on Monday, June 7th. ### FARM NEWS

#### DEMONSTRATION PLOT TEST CARROT CONTROL

Due to the difficulty which Halton municipalities have been meeting in getting a kill of Wild Carrot on their roadsides, the Halton Soil and Crop Improvement Association is establishing some "Demonstration Control Plots." These are located on the 3rd Line of Esqueving Township, extending from the Hornby Base Line some 1000 feet north on both sides of the road. Different formulations and volumes of spray using both the ester and amine type of 2-4 D's are being tested. The first series were sprayed during the current week — a second series will be sprayed in August or September just prior to flowering. The applications were made by Medforth Powtress, custom weed sprayer, of Trafalgar Township. Only time will tell whether or not the demonstration plots will solve our Wild Carrot problem in Halton.

loom. A few years ago a plant of Yellow Rocket was a rarity. Today nearly every meadow and pasture contains the odd plant and some fields are really polluted. If you are in the fortunate group with only the odd plant here and there, by all means pull them. True, in these days of labour shortage it is easier said than done, but don't fool with this weed. It is a tremendous seeder — it is a perennial, and if something is not done about those odd plants, two or three years will see it in possession of the field or farm. Then the only alternative will be to spray, and spray and spray.

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
