For landscape oil paintings Mountain Union Wil came first, Dublin W.I. second and Palermo W.I. third.



BRITAIN MOVES FOR DECONTROL OF MEAT

Price controls and rationing of all meats and bacon by the British Food Ministry is scheduled to end at midnight July 3rd. Beginning July 1st farmers will again be able to market their livestock by private treaty or by auction. The National Farmers' Union has also announced plans to set up a Fatstock Marketing Corporation, to provide a further alternative and voluntary method of sale on dressed weight basis to producers. Sir James Turner, NFU president, stated that the Corporation "would be ementially a competitive trading organization operating in a free market, and would stand or fall by the service it gave its customers - the producers, the butcher and the housewife."

Private meat imports from countries with which the U.K. has bulk purchase agreements will resume as soon after July 3rd as contracts are completed, with private trade with all other countries free to resume on July 4th. In the case of bacon, however, the Food Ministry will continue as the sole importer but will resell bacon to the trade which will be free of rationing and price
