**Sandy Buchanan, Bernice Wilson  
Jr. Farmer Major Prizewinners**

Halton Junior Farmers under the leadership of Art Bennett, Associate Agricultural Representative for Halton and Peel counties, held their annual live stock judging competitions on Friday. Forty-eight young men judged ten classes of livestock on the farms of Reford Gardhouse, Gerald Graham, F. O. Hunter, M. T. McNabb & Sons, and Stanley May, of Esqueping Township, also at the farm of J. H. Willmot & Son, Trafalgar. During the afternoon the contestants gave oral reasons on five of the classes judged in the morning—the official judges being Ed. Starr of the Ontario Livestock Branch, Toronto; Herb. Norry, Associate Agric. Rep. for Wellington County; Harold Buck, Associate Agric. Rep. for Wentworth County; Garnet Norrish, Canada Dept. of Agriculture; and J. H. Willmot, of Milton.

Don Matthews, president of Halton Juniors, presided at the announcement of awards and presentation of prizes held in the Milton Town Hall the same evening. Sandy Buchanan, of Moffat, won the Hamilton Spectator award of a Championship Trip to the All Club Congress in Chicago. The award is based on the all round ability of the contestants, namely, leadership,

participation in 4H Club work and Junior Farmer activities as well as judging ability. The runner-up here was Earl Wilson, of Norval, who was awarded the Kingsway Kiwanis Scholarship.

David Pelletier was the high contestant of the day; with John C. Willmot in second place. Other awards were as follows: High novice, Harold Patterson, Milton; Duncan Campbell Trophy (high man in beef)—Don Matthews; Donald Robertson Trophy (high man in horse)—David Pelletier; Baronston Trophy (high man in dairy)—Norman Bird; Mason Knitting Company Trophy (high man in sheep)—Barry Archer; Thos. Blakelock Trophy (high man in swine)—John Willmot; Palermo Juniors Trophy (high coach)—Don Johnson; Norval Juniors Trophy (high aggregate score)—Sandy Buchanan; Dr. R. K. Anderson Trophy (high club)—Norval; Bank of Nova Scotia Trophy (high township team)—Esqueping; The high Junior (16 years and under)—Norman Bird; high Intermediate (17 to 21 years)—Barry Archer; high Senior (21 to 25 years)—David Pelletier.

Another highlight of the evening's programme was the presentation of awards to Halton's 4H Home Makers. Here Mrs Borgstrom, Home Economist, was assisted by Mrs Max Featherstone, President of Halton District W.I.'s, and Mrs J. L. Ellerby, District W.I. Secretary. The Halton W.I. Championship Trip was awarded to Bernice Wilson of Ashgrove, who will accompany a group of Ontario Juniors on a bus trip this fall to Ottawa, New York, and Washington. Provincial Honour Pins, emblematic of 12 completed projects, were presented to Marilyn Barnes, Marlon Bird, Barbara Cunningham, Bernice Wilson, Kathleen Kirkpatrick, White County Honour Pins (emblematic of 6 completed projects) were presented to Fredmae Stull, Shirley Downs, and Joan McCarron. The Bank of Toronto Trophy was

presented by M. E. Kerr, Manager of the Oakville branch, to the Nelson 4H Club—the team members being Helen Vivian, Glenns Ross, and Ruth Featherstone.

Still another pleasing feature of the evening was the presentation by George E. Elliott, Milton, of two trophies in memory of his father, the late John Robertson Elliott, to Barbara Cunningham and Jean Patterson, who represented Halton in the Inter-County Debating Competition this past winter.

The concluding feature of the outstanding evening's programme was the demonstration in square dancing, by two sets representing North Halton and Milton Juniors. A composite set selected from these two outstanding groups will represent Halton in the inter-county square dancing competition to be held at Western Ontario Junior Farmers' Field Day, at O.A.C., Guelph, on June 19th.

**FARMERS HEAR DATA ON FORMULA PRICING**

Monday evening of last week saw what was perhaps the most outstanding meeting held by Halton Milk Producers in the past 20 years. The meeting was held in Stewarttown Hall, with three speakers, Everett Biggs, Dairy Commissioner for Ontario; Wm. Holles, president of Toronto Milk Producers' Association, and Wm. Willmot, secretary of the same organization.

The speakers dealt with the new agreement based on "Formula Pricing"—"Bill 68"—which combines all dairy legislation under one act; "Bulk Hauling" and the proposed "Surplus Milk Plant".

It was interesting to learn that in contrast to 78 distributors who operated in the Toronto Market in 1932, there are today only 24. Consumption on the other hand has increased from 91 million quarts in 1930, to 130 million quarts in 1953.

Under formula pricing, the producers' price is based on the following formula:

- Wholesale Index ..... 20%
- Weekly Wages ..... 20%
- Commodities and services used by Farmers ..... 30%
- Price of Butterfat Index ..... 10%
- Price of Cheese Index ..... 10%
- Price of Condensed products Index ..... 10%

This sets the price for quota milk testing 3.4% B.F. at \$4.53 per cwt, against the old price of \$4.80. No change will take place in this price until the combined weighted correction index varies 10 points one way or the other.

The meeting was arranged by President W. R. Royle, and Secretary John M. Bird.
