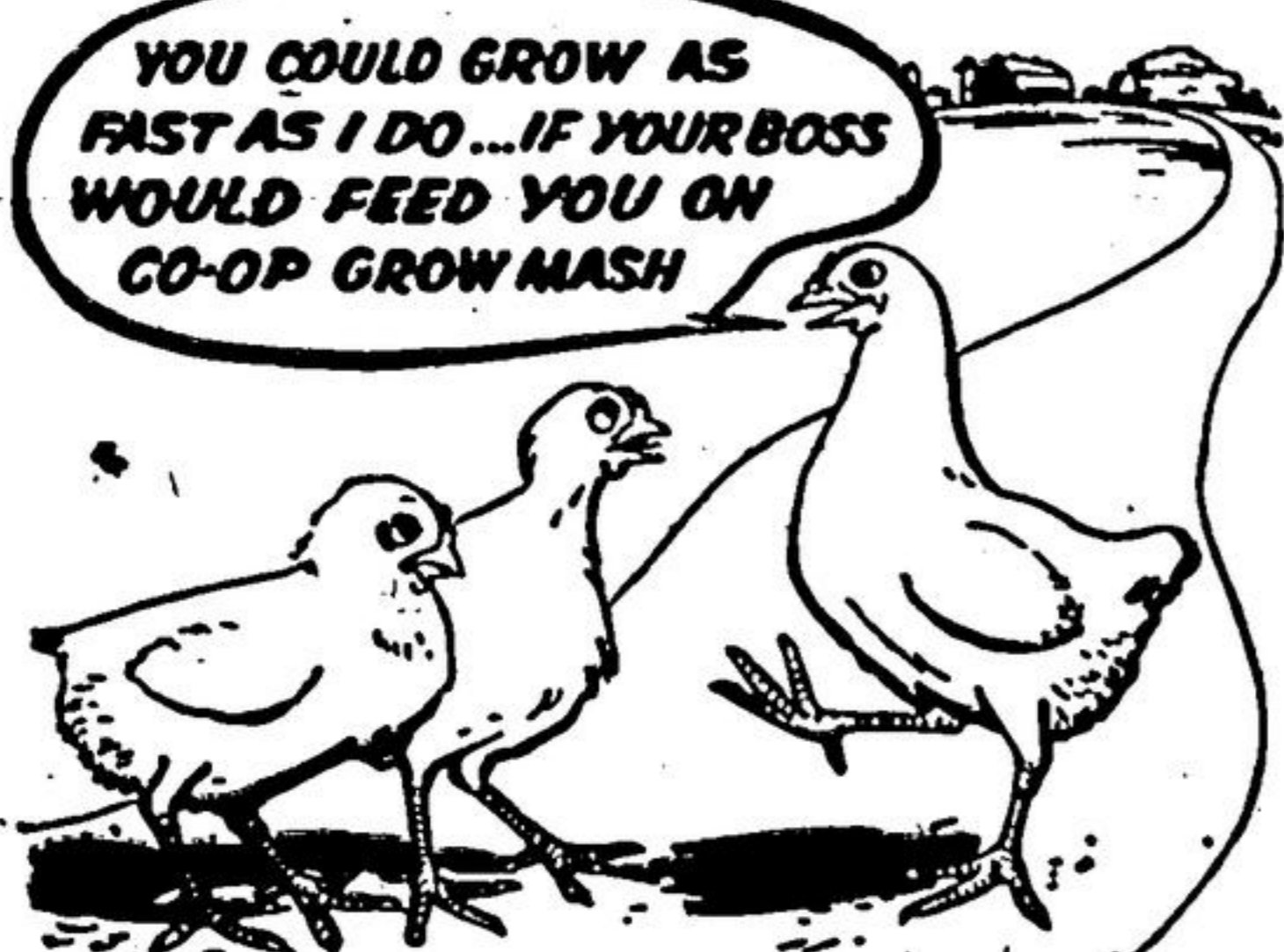

**Halton Reaches \$37,000
Blind Building Quota**

Halton County has reached its quota of \$37,000 in the campaign to raise funds for the new rehabilitation centre of the Canadian National Institute for the Blind, according to L. D. Maxwell, county chairman.

Georgetown and Glen Williams raised over \$3,000, which was 125 per cent of their quota. Harold McClure was community chairman, and Dick Licata organizer.

Mr. Maxwell said the response of the public and industry to the C.N.I.B. building fund was particularly gratifying in view of the number of requests being made by canvassers for other charitable organizations.

"On behalf of the C.N.I.B. Building Fund Headquarters management, our sincere thanks is extended to all committee members, canvassers, the press—and particularly to the people of Halton County for their wholehearted support," said Mr. Maxwell.

C.N.I.B. Building Fund Headquarters have announced receipt of close to \$3,000,000 toward a target of \$3,150,000. C.N.I.B. officials were confident the goal would be reached.

The first sod for the new C.N.I.B. rehabilitation centre was broken in Toronto a week ago Monday.

Employee Many Years**

A Georgetown resident since 1922 Henry Latimer, 73, died in Peel Memorial Hospital, Brampton, on Thursday. He had been a patient there since the previous Sunday, after a fall which he suffered at his home on John Street.

Native of Collingwood, his death marked the first break in the family of the late James and Elizabeth Blanchard Latimer. As a young man he lived in Alliston and in Georgetown he had worked as a farmer with the late Professor H. L. Hutt and at the present Cedarvale School when it was a school for Armenian boys. For many years he was employed with the Georgetown Lumber Co. and with Hawes & Nelson until he retired three years ago. His wife, Annie Campbell, died in 1921.

Surviving are three children, Margaret, Mrs. J. D. Booth, of Brampton; Lorraine, Mrs. J. W. Marchmont and William, Georgetown, and four grandchildren.

He also leaves four brothers and four sisters, John Latimer, Robert Latimer and Mrs. Herb Garbutt, Hamilton; Mrs. W. D. Hawkins, Mrs. Bruce Logan, Mrs. Dave McKilligan and Harvey Latimer, Alliston; and James Latimer, Raglan.

Rev. John A. McDermid of St. Paul's United Church, Brampton, conducted the funeral service on Saturday at the McClure Funeral Home here and interment was in Greenwood Cemetery. Pallbearers were Walter Gray, Vance Kentner, Norton Nelson, Fred Anthony, Harold Bennett and Cedric Cross.
