#### Seek Recruits Here Ground Observer Corps

Hope that Georgetown will take a more active part in the work of the Ground Observers Corps was expressed by FO.W. A. Longley when he spoke at a meeting last night in the Library.

At present Kaith Barber is ento ployed at this important volunteer task, which entails "spotting" of planes flying over town whenever possible, plus participation in exercises which are held now and then to test the strength of a system which could be invaluable in wartime and also fills a peacetime need.

Briefly, the work of the GOC can be explained as a joint Canada USA plan which is an auxiliary to a network of reder stations which need the human element to supplement their information. Low flying planes are not detected on radar and it is also subject to the interference encountered by TV sets at times.


Gradually across Canada, volunteer workers are manning observation posts and phoning information to central offices where it is correlated with other data and passed on to the propery air force authorities.

A post is being set up at Brampton Reformatory and J. A. McCleave, Brampton is a regional supervisor. "Filter station" for district information is in Barrie.

Mr. Longley told of the importance of the work in peacetime by recounting air accidents which have been reported. Valuable time and thousands of dollars was saved in these cases.
