**Acton Minister Preaches  
At Church Anniversary**

The anniversary service of Norval United Church was held on Sunday, with the village church crowded to capacity and beautifully decorated with yellow and purple iris and peonies.

The minister officiating was Rev. E. A. Currey of Acton United Church. He began by quoting Ralph Waldo Emerson's famous lines about the "venerable church our fathers built to God" and spoke with vigor and animation on the theme of Christian discipline and its rigorous sense of duty.

The message of Christ, he maintained, should be just as valid today as it was in the beginning. During his sermon he pointed out that only Christianity can outweigh the hydrogen bomb. The important thing to remember in Norval's future expansion, he concluded, is that the church, unlike many new city churches, had been there first, which is a credit to the church.

The choir sang the beautiful anthems "O Come to my Heart, Lord Jesus" and "In Heavenly Love Abiding." Soloist Mrs. Jean May gave a sensitive rendition of the celebrated Panis Angelicus. At the end of the service Mrs. Clark Lyons and Mrs. Glen Laidlaw sang a duet "Father in Heaven."
