HALTON TEAM TOPS DAIRY DAY ENTRIES

Some 2500 to 3000 attended the second annual dairy exhibition day held on Wednesday on the Wm. J. Murphy farm, near Lindsay. A full programme of exhibits, demonstrations etc. pertaining to the dairy industry held the interest of the large crowd. The Dairy Day Quality Milk Production Competition open to a team of two young people between the ages of 18 and 24 years, brought entries from ten counties. Each team had to give an actual demonstration based on the correct procedure in milking a cow — on the care of milk — washing of equipment, etc., along with a running commentary over a public address system. Perhaps we should add, that the team members to be eligible must have completed at least five 4H Club Projects, and reside on a dairy farm. Halton Juniors sent as their representatives Barbara Cunningham, of Georgetown R R No. 2, and John W. Pickett, Hornby R R No. 1, who took the top award.

The Peel County team of Mary McKinney and Blythe Meek took the second award, with the Waterloo County team in third place. It is rather significant that the Halton and Peel teams were both coached by R. J. Stewart, of the Ontario Livestock Branch, Toronto, and Art Bennett, associate agricultural representative for Halton and Peel counties.
