Government Should Lead the Way

The question of civil defence is one which bothers us whenever we start thinking of its importance. Yet, like most other people, we are too busy with mundane affairs to do something about it locally.

As we are drawn more and more into the Toronto-Hamilton orbit, it behooves Georgetowners to do some serious thinking when we have the time to do so, for we would truly be in a danger spot if Russia should some day decide to light the fire of a third war. But thinking must be accompanied by some action if it is to accomplish the proper results, and action can only happen when we have the proper leadership.

There must be many in town who are capable of this leadership, but like any major effort, there must be direction from a higher source.

The government has made some slight acknowledgment of civil defence importance in appointing a coordinating body and circu-

lating some publicity material. This falls far short of what we consider their duty in arousing action in every major municipality in the country. We suggest that direction should come from a federal and provincial source in the form of paid organizers who would spend some time in a town, give their advice and help in organizing local committees and see that the committees are functioning in the proper way, then make periodic visits to check on the work being done.

One cannot expect a local council to add this to their already onerous duties, neither can we expect a service club or a Chamber of Commerce to go ahead on their own. But with the help of a fulltime government appointee to spark them to action, there would certainly be no dearth of local people who would dig in and do their part in a community effort which someday may be needed much more than any civic service we now possess.

The Church Needs Men

In a day when churches of all denominations are calling for recruits for the ministry, it is encouraging to see that some young men who received their secular education in Georgetown schools and their early religious training in local churches, have felt a call to this service.

Sunday morning Bob Matthews, who has just been ordained an Anglican deacon, preached at the St. George's service. A few weeks ago, Jim Kirkwood conducted the service in Ballinafad United, prior to leaving for a summer mission, then further training at theological college in Toronto. Every now and then, we think of Reuben Salmon, Arthur McCollum, Arthur Dayfoot, John McDermid, Ross Cameron, Arthur Lane and Frank Bolger,

other men who have gone into religious orders whom Georgetown can share in some measure.

But these are all too few, and there should be many more joining the ranks. And like any profession, some of the direction must come from the home, for the ministry entails education, not only through books and university studies, but in outlook and spirit, and a decision to forego some of the worldly comforts in exchange for the satisfaction of doing a job for humanity.

We are proud of young men of Bob Matthews' calibre and glad that Georgetown can take some credit for the good they will do in the future. Let's hope more will follow their example in years to come.
