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
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FIREMEN ATTEND CHURCH SERVICE

Local firemen attended by the Georgetown Girls' Pipe Band paraded to Divine Worship at St. John's United Church on Sunday morning. Rev. John M. Smith welcomed the group and paid tribute to them for their service rendered to the community. The lesson was read from Romans, Chapter 12 and the sermon was based on the theme "Preventing Evil." Basing his remarks on the text Deut. 22 Mr. Smith stressed the importance of preventing evil before it occurs. Among the manifold ministries of the Christian church the program of fighting existing evil in individuals, societies and nations is important, but just as important is the effort of the church to train young and old to choose between right and wrong as it confronts them in daily living.

Alfred Toat was the soloist for the service and Norman Laird organist.

NORVAL Organist, Contralto In Norval Recital

Two talented ex-Norvalites appeared in recital with the church choir in an interesting musical event at Norval United Church on June 14th.

This organ-recital and concert could well be called the outstanding cultural event of the year. A large and enthusiastic audience gave a warm response to a program which included works by Bach, Mozart, Handel, Schubert and Puccini. Among the choral numbers were the three part ladies chorus in Heavenly Love Abiding and Holy Father, Cheer Our Way.

The voice of Olive Rankine Corrigan, soloist at St. Paul's Anglican Church, Toronto, is not unknown to music lovers of the community, and is a voice one never tires of hearing. Seldom is a voice so rich and powerful heard within the walls of a small village church. Her controlled and beautiful singing of the Lord's Prayer was an unforgettable experience. Other highlights of her performance were the Villanelle of Eva del Pacqua and Puccini's O My Beloved Daddy.

Lloyd Hustler, AGGO, also a former Norval resident, gave masterly organ renditions of a Bach prelude and Fugue in C Major and the nostalgic Schubert Serenade. A moving version of Monk's Abide With Me was a fitting finale for the evening. The concert raised more than a hundred dollars for the church organ fund.
