Tells Council Ladies Music Festival Record

After a stroll in Miss H. A. Staunton's lovely garden Friday afternoon members of the Local Council of Women held a brief business meeting with Mrs. J. W. Kerr presiding.

Ruth Evans, president for three years of Halton Music Festival gave an outline of that organization's work which except for a break during the war years, has functioned continuously since 1927. Designed to discover latent singing talent and to develop music appreciation, its aim is to have as many as possible participate. In 1927 the entire program, seven classes was completed in one evening. This year three full days and an extra evening were required for 38 classes.

To maintain the interest of boys, the Halton festival was the first to have classes for unchanged voices. The financial burden is met by private subscriptions and organizations, but careful planning is necessary and the executive has much preparatory work in arranging for adjudicators, scholarships, medals and the many details required such as printing, piano tuning and rental.

In Miss Evans' opinion, the efforts have been richly rewarded by creation of an interest in music. Georgetown contestants have been rather outstanding and it is interesting to note that Georgetown had the first school in Halton in which music was taught.
