In his services on Sunday morning at St. John's United Church, Rev. John M. Smith spoke strongly on the challenge to Christians for fuller service, both to fulfil Christ's call to them and to meet the studied assault of other ideologies. So much of our complacency and passivity on the other side when service is needed, is robbing Christianity of its rightful place in our world, and of its effect in lifting our world upward to its Creator and Saviour, closer to a happier and fairer way of life. Mr. Smith spoke from the words of Paul to the Romans: The good that I would I do not. Strange words for one so zealous as Paul, so, what about us?

We remember Christ on the night just before His death, going into the garden of Gethsemane, with some of His closest friends, as He went further to commune with His Father God. He asked His friends to watch between Him and those who sought His life. O yes, they mean to, but the flesh was weak. "The good they would do, they did not." And they are in a large company, through the years since and today. And Paul, probably the closest link between Christ and Christianity, certainly its greatest missionary, found Himself in that company. Like Paul, when we come face to face with Christ, and get a vision of Him in His love and power, His leadership His teaching, His forgiveness and grace we are beckoned to a higher life; it does something to us, and we are ready and even anxious for His service. "Lord what wilt Thou have me to do." We aspire to live as near like Him as we can and do good. But what we ourselves want, with influences of the world about us, seems to have a powerful hold on us, and we do what we would not, and do not what we would.

It does disturb us, and Christ's challenge to us is to struggle on, keeping our vision before us, never satisfied with the wrong around us and within us, always seeking to do the good we would, and give our Master the fullest service we can render.
