



4H- Giris' Chabs Hold Conference at O.A.C.

An event of great interest to 4-H Homemaking Club girls of Ontario was held last week at the OAC in Guelph, when delegates from every county and district met for their first Girls' Conference.

Halton County' was represented by Marion Bird, of the Ashgrove Club; and Marilyn Cleave from Norval. Delegates were required to be at least sixteen years of age with County 'Hondurs' (Six 4-H Homemaking Club Projects) and were selected for reliability and contribution to club work.

Theme of the conference was "You and Your World" with subtopics: 'Your Club and You,' 'Your Club and Your Home', and 'Your Club and Your Community,' coming up for discussion.

Interested highlights of the Conference were a Get-Asquainted Party in Macdonald Hall, several music sessions under the direction of Mr. Ralph Kidd, of the OAC; Instruction on Flower Arrangement, Landscaping and Vegetable Culture, by members of the College staff; and a Food Demonstration of Buffet Service, at Macdonald Institute; as well as a tour of that building.

A banquet in the college cafeeria Thursday night was addressed by Mr. C. D. Graham, Deputy minlater of Agriculture, who also chose the occasion to present Miss Florence P. Eadle, with her "Quarter Century" pin. Miss Eadle, as supervisor of Junior Extension for the Women's Institute Branch and Home Economics Service of the Department of Agriculture, is in charge of 4-H Homemaking Club work in Ontario, and it was therefore very fitting that she should have been recognized at this event when her club members from all over the province were present.

Other staff members who took part in the conference were Miss Ethel Chapman, who spoke on the subject "Culture in the Country Home," Miss Jean Scott, who introduced the Conference Theme; and Miss Lulu Row, under whose supervision was presented "A Wardrobe for a Teenager." Representatives from Nelson Club in Halton County, Ruth Featherstone and Helen Vivian, were the participants in this demonstration.

One hundred Ontario rural girls have returned to their homes with greater enthusiasm, wider vision, and more appreciation of country life and 4-H, work as a result of their attendance at the Girls' Conference.
