**Halton and Peel 4-H Clubs
Enjoy Niagara Bus Trip**

One hundred and thirty members of the Halton and Peel 4-H Agricultural Clubs enjoyed a bus trip to the Niagara Peninsula on Tuesday of this week. The highlights of the day's programme were perhaps the conducted tour of the Ontario Hydro Electric Power Project; the scenic drive at Niagara Falls; the recreational period at the Chippewa Picnic Grounds; and a final tour at the Vineland Experimental Station. The Hydro project is a tremendous and almost unbelievable development — certainly one that is of interest to young and old

alike. The party was received by Dr. E. F. Palmer, the veteran director of the outstanding experimental station at Vineland, who described briefly some of the projects which are under way. Vineland has over the years rendered a service of inestimable value to the fruit and vegetable growers of the province. Not only have they bred a long list of new varieties of "V" fruits and vegetables, but their programme pertaining to soils, storage problems, disease and insect control is invaluable information to the fruit and vegetable industries.

The one day bus tour was conducted by Art Bennett, associate agricultural representative for Halton and Peel counties, assisted by club leaders, A. T. Woodley, Fred Nurse, John W. Eicket and Sandy Buchanan.
