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AMERICAN COMPANY CONSIDERS PLANT HERE

Cloverdale Heights Subdivision Starts on Harold Cleave Farm

Latest in Georgetown's growing list of subdivisions is Cloverdale Heights, with 60 homes planned on a 17-acre tract of land being purchased from ex-Mayor Harold Cleave.

The subdivision will lie between Main Street and Churchill Crescent, and takes in land south of Mr. Cleave's farm home. All the property is within town limits.

Work will be started this week by the contractors, Glatt Construction Ltd. of Port Credit, who plan to build in groups of ten. Homes will have frontages of 50 to 55 feet and the contractor offers four bungalow plans for 3-bedroom houses and a storey and a half 4-bedroom plan. All homes will be solid clay-brick, full basement and forced air oil heated. They will be financed under the National Housing Act.

Selling agent, on an exclusive basis, is R. W. Butt Ltd., Port Credit realtor, who plans to open a branch office here soon, with a salesman on the property. The first house is planned to be ready by mid-September.

The new subdivision will add two new streets to town, Cleaveholm, which takes its name from the present owner of the property, and Mary St., named after Mr. Glatt's small daughter. An existing street, Henry St. will also be used as an entrance to the subdivision.

WHAT COUNCIL DID

PLAN ERECTION OF NEW "STOP" SIGNS

Safety measures will be taken at several dangerous corners in town when new "stop" signs are erected this summer.

Monday, the town council agreed to a list of some 23 corners where stop signs will be placed. These include several entrances onto No. 7, a dangerous corner at Edith-Park where several accidents have occurred, Emery-McNabb, Charles-Maple and McNabb-Albert.

Signs will be placed in the new concrete markers designed by the town, to which street names can be added at a later date.

Alfred Sykes made a return trip to discuss with council a parking situation on Market St. beside his home. He complained that cars and trucks frequently ran onto his lawn and that a fence which he had erected was damaged. He asked that council erect a barricade sufficient to keep vehicles outside his property line, and also build a fence. Council decided to build the barricade first, which will be constructed of hydro poles, and advised Mr. Sykes to lay complaints with police if further property damage was caused.

An American electronics company is considering Georgetown as the site of a Canadian subsidiary, and a ten acre local property may be optioned by the end of this week.

Monday an official of the firm was in town and expressed interest in two locations. A price on one of these has been submitted by the owner, and Cr. Doug Sargent, industrial chairman of council, is optimistic that the deal will materialize.

The company would have 5,000 to 6,000 square feet of floor space and would employ about 30 skilled and semi-skilled workers to start. Contrary to most industries, they are not interested in locations near railways and in fact, because of the nature of production, prefer to be away from smoke and dust. It is also interesting to note that company policy leans towards beautification of industrial properties and their location would be an asset in any district in town.

Drilling for Oil on McDonald Farm Property

After finding oil gas on his property southwest of Acton last week, Tony Seynuck has started drilling a No. 2 well on property in the Scotch Block owned by Mr. and Mrs. Alvin McDonald, Queen Street, Georgetown.

Mr. Seynuck says that, according to fact-finding instruments, there are good chances of oil and gas on this property at a reasonable depth. The farm is situated on the corner of the 4th Concession, "Esqueuing, and the Speyside sideroad.

Mr. Seynuck owns 18 acres in the area where gas was found last week, and has leased well rights on 10,000 acres, approximately 48 sq. miles in the district.

Tony Seynuck, Romanian by birth, came to Acton in 1919 and has been drilling in the area for over 25 years. His No. 1 well is presently capped with a temporary

WHAT COUNCIL DID

Will Proceed With Queen Street Paving

Queen Street will be paved this year, but at Monday's council meeting plans were shelved to widen the street four feet at present.

Road chairman Al Norton expressed doubt at the wisdom of spending six or seven thousand dollars on a complete resurfacing job. He would rather see the worst holes patched and the money spent on widening.

Reeve Stan Allen opposed any widening while the town is still gravelling and oiling other streets which could be paved.

Tenders have been called for 1500 feet of sidewalk on Victoria Street and Victoria Ave. to replace damaged pavement, and the work is planned to be done next month.

A drainage problem on lower Main Street will be cleared up next week, said Deputy-Reeve Norton.

Water-tax arrears were reviewed and the collector instructed to "get tough" with a few delinquents, and contact lesser offenders by letter asking for prompt payment.

Action was still delayed on moving the present garbage dump, when Mayor Armstrong reported the possibility of joint action with Milton in establishing a common dumping ground between the two towns.

Council is still considering purchase of a Bullclam machine. They did not seem interested in a proposition from Bob Lane to use property he owns near the sewage disposal plant, which he would fill and cover at a cost of \$12,000 a year (\$6300 in excess of his present collection contract).

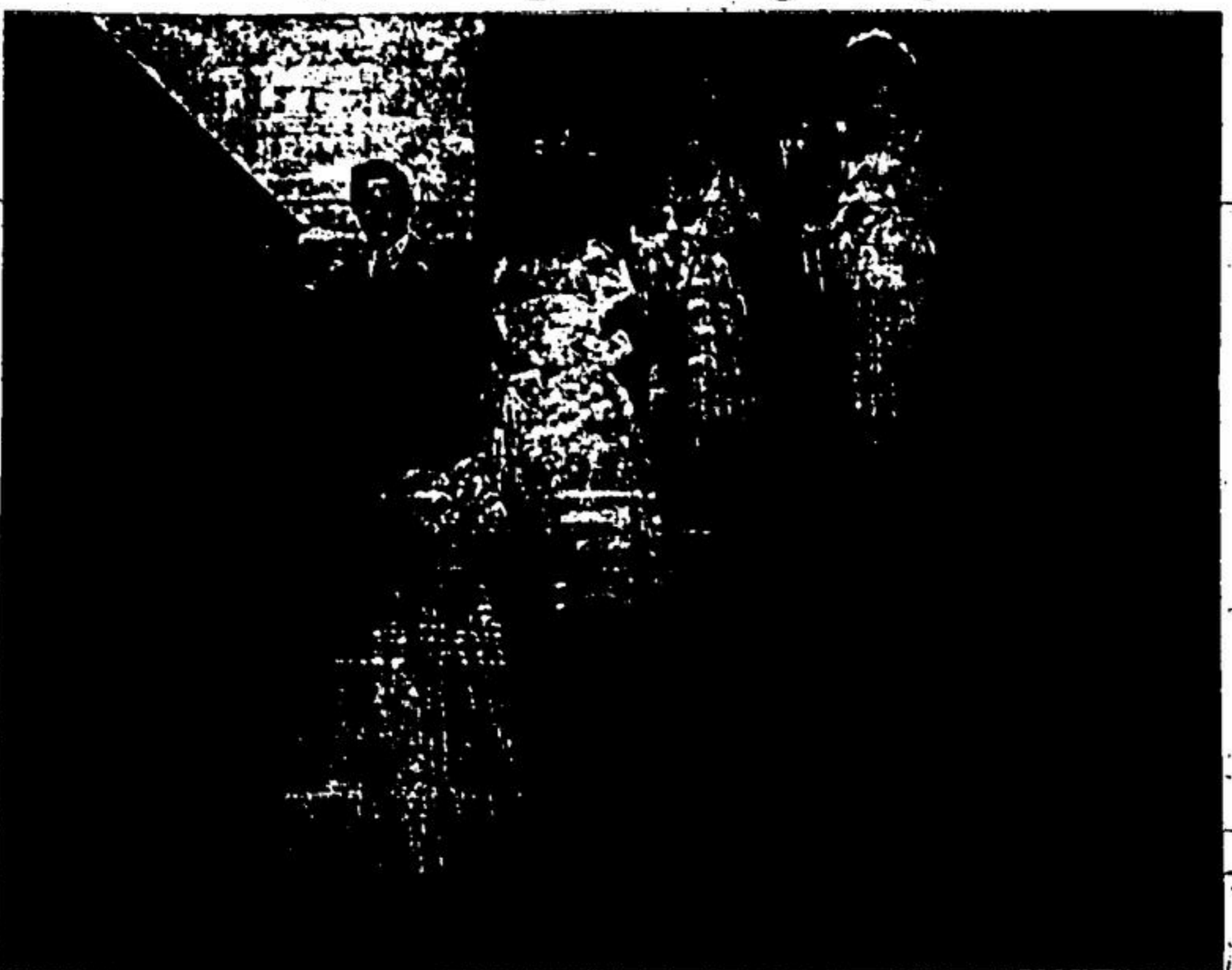
Mayor Armstrong suggested painting a white centre line at the Church St. curve onto Charles St. and contacting the property owner at the Charles-Maple corner about lowering his lot to provide better visibility for motorists rounding that corner.

A \$100 grant was made to the Ave. bridge for expenses of delegates to the convention in Milton this week.

A by-law will be prepared for installing sewers on Edward Street.
