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CANADIAN MISSIONARIES GRADUATE

Thirteen Canadians will be among a class of 118 students to graduate from The Watchtower Bible School of Gilead located at South Lansing, New York. Graduation exercises will be held at The Grandstand, Exhibition Park, Toronto, Canada, as a principal feature of a five-day Bible convention of Jehovah's witnesses July 21-25. It is expected that 25,000 will attend.
