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

#### New Pictorial Bible. Designed for Children

"The Newset and Most Modern Bible", "a Picture Book Bible", "The Jubilee Youth Bible" as it has been variously termed will be released to the public in September Copies of it have already been presented to Prince Charles and Prin-

ceas Anne. Packed with 500 pictures that are simple anapahot sketches of every bird, beast, tree and flower mentioned in the narrative, the attractive volume is the Authorized Version, "without note or comment" in keeping with the 150 year policy of its publishers, the British and For-

eign Bible Sciety. For the first time this new line of plain and practical illustration is introduced into the Bible. It is really an up-to-date visual aid rather than the old time type of story picture. Route-maps accompany the text to show the reader the goad he travels, milestones give the distance between different places, time signals count out the passing of the centuries, badges or identity cards indicate the nationality of the people he meets. City gates and dwellings of the points visited are also shown. Highlights of the book are the special close-up studies of the Temple buildings, officers, vestments and vessels of worship; the costumes, coins, countryside and customs of the time of Christ; and the journeys of the apostle Paul.

It is the complete libble but so arranged that the narrative flows on in uninterrupted fashion; passages, especially in the Old Testament, which are concerned with genealogies, itineraries, specifications and measurements, and other technical matters, are placed in three columns on the lower half of the page, but in their right sequence and of equal importance, yet not impeding the Bible Story.

Several years work has been put into this handy edition for young people and children. The aim and purpose is "to bring the story to life". It is published to commentorate the Third Jubilee - 150th aninversary of the Society formed when William Wilberforce and some of his friends heard the story of Mary Jones, a little Welsh girl, who trudged many miles over rough roads of her native country to buy a Bible only to find the last copy sold upon her arrival at Bala.

The first edition soon to be available will consist of 100,000 copies and is printed by Oxford University Press, and distributed by the Society below publication cost.

The editor is Mr. John Stirling, who has had wide experience in work of this kind, he is responsible for "The Bible for Today", published by the Oxford University Press, for "The Study Bible", in 20 volunes, published by Messrs. Cassell and Co., and for "The Atlas of the Life of Christ" and "The Atlas of the Epistles", published by Messra. Geo. Philips and Son Ltd. Mr. Hurace J. Knowles, the artist of this beautiful work, is versed in ancient Jewish history, ritual, architecture, etc. and in archaeology.

FARM NEWS

#### ARMY WORMS CLOSE BE ON THE LOOKOUT

While no scrious outbreak of ormy worms has been reported to date in Halton county, Simcoe, Grey Bruce, Huron, Lambton, Oxford, Perth, Waterloo, Lincoln, York and Peel counties have all reported considerable damage from this pest. Any Halton farmer noticing these greenish brown caterpillars, which have longitudinal stripes on their backs, should phone the Agricultural Representative's office. Oat and barley fields seem hardest hit, and earlier this week we viewed a 12acre field of oats in Peel County, where all leaves and several kernels were stripped from the stalks. In one area alone in Peel County poison bait at the rate of 25 lbs. of bran, 1 lb. of Paris Green, 1 - 2 qts of molasses and 21/2 gals, of water per acre, was spread by hand over 300 acres of oat crop on July 21-22 and 23. We do not quote this to alarm you, but merely in the hope that all farmers will be on the lookout for this pest. Army worms can be serious but also can be controlled if poisoned before they begin to
