

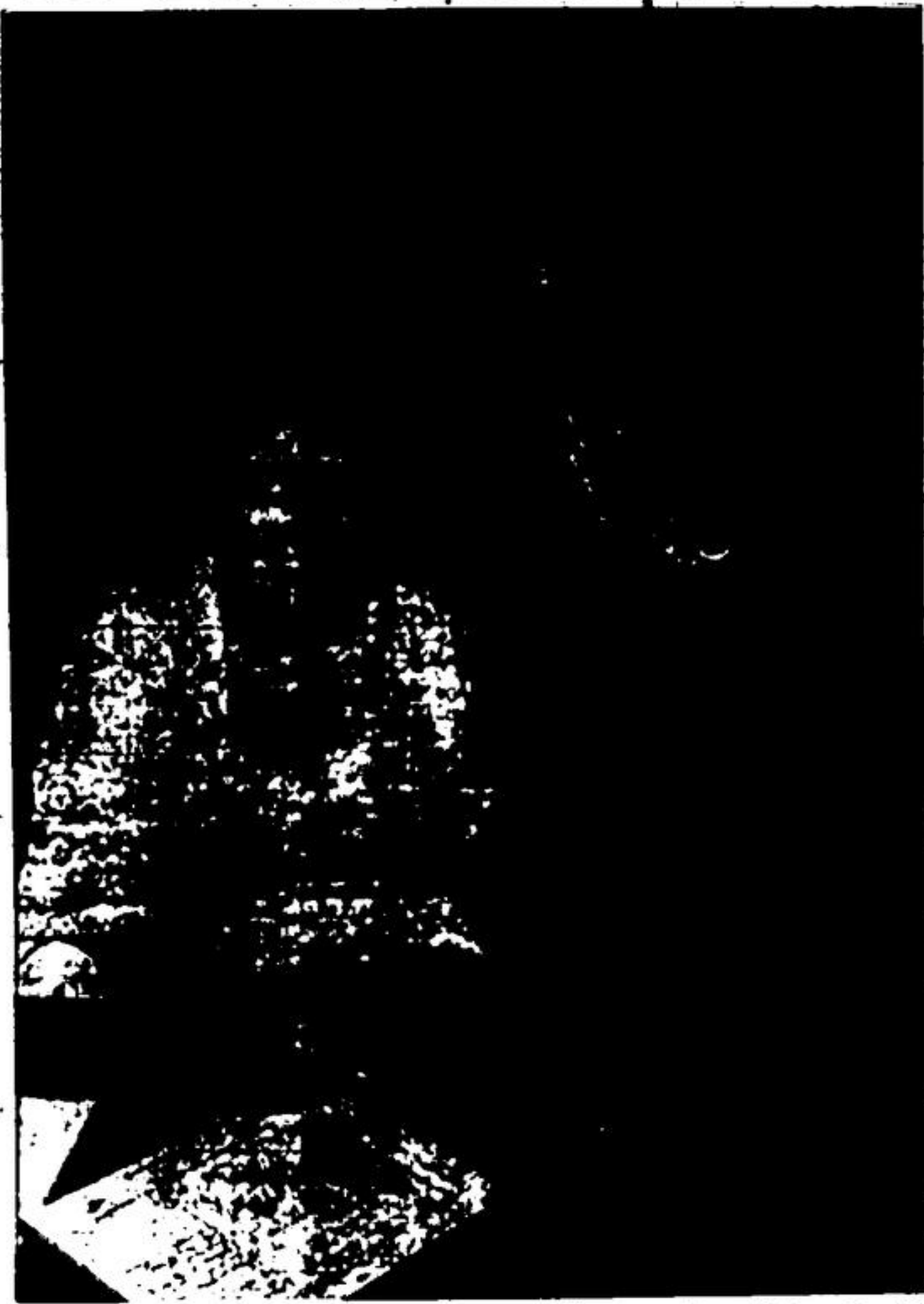

Choose Local Cadet Sails Today for Duke's Honor Guard European Tour

A young Georgetown army cadet who was chosen to spend the summer at the training school at Banff will have a further thrill when he is one of a guard of honour for the Duke of Edinburgh at the British Empire Games in Vancouver.

Bill Hardman, head cadet at Georgetown High School this year, is the fortunate young man. The honour guard comprises members of the three armed services, and it may be the same one in which another Georgetown cadet, RMC Cadet George McClure, with the navy on the west coast this summer, will appear.

Bill will have the rank of lieutenant for the occasion. He is one of three members of his family interested in the army. His father Bob served overseas in the last war and brother Bud is with Canadian troops in Germany.

A Georgetown farmer who retired recently, Dean Leslie is sailing aboard the S. S. Scythia today to spend several months in Britain and on the continent.

Reopen Grocery Store On Main Street North

Closed for some time because of Mrs. Dorothy Swan's illness, the grocery and confectionery store on Main Street North will be reopened Friday by her brother-in-law Archie Girard. The store was operated for many years by Mrs. Swan and her mother, the late Mrs. Loud.

Mr. Girard will call his place of business North End Grocery and Confectionery. Mr. and Mrs. Girard, their son Teddy and daughter Mrs. Cecelia Jones moved into the house adjoining the store last week. They were operating the present Dickson store on Water St. when they left town twenty years ago, and have since lived in Paris, Collingwood and Cathcart.

Shortage of downtown parking space may be alleviated this week, when an agreement for use of land owned by J. J. Gibbens is signed by the mayor and clerk acting for the town.

Monday night, councillors looked over the property and remarked on the generous gesture by Mr. Gibbens to use the land for the next five years at a nominal rental fee of \$15. This year he will net \$13.50 as taxes on the property are \$13.50.

Cost to the town to convert the land, which lies behind a large business block owned by Mr. Gibbens, is estimated at \$50 for bulldozing and some fill. If the owner wishes to terminate the agreement before five years expires, he is to pay the town \$50.

All town oil contracts, presently held by Bill Bailey, Brampton, will be turned over to W. H. Kentner & Son, who have installed a local service, in view of the company paying heavy taxes in town.

New water mains will be laid on Joseph Street and Orchard Blvd. to service the new McNally subdivision.

A brief exchange of words between road chairman Norton and Reeve Allen resulted in a defeated motion to move some hydro poles on Chapel Street for road widening. The reeve opposed moving the poles until next year when the actual paving is done and the funds can be taken from the debenture issue. This year, cost of moving would be in current expenses. Mr. Norton was supported by Cra. McGilvray and Sargent in maintaining that the poles should be moved at once, to allow the road to settle before paving.

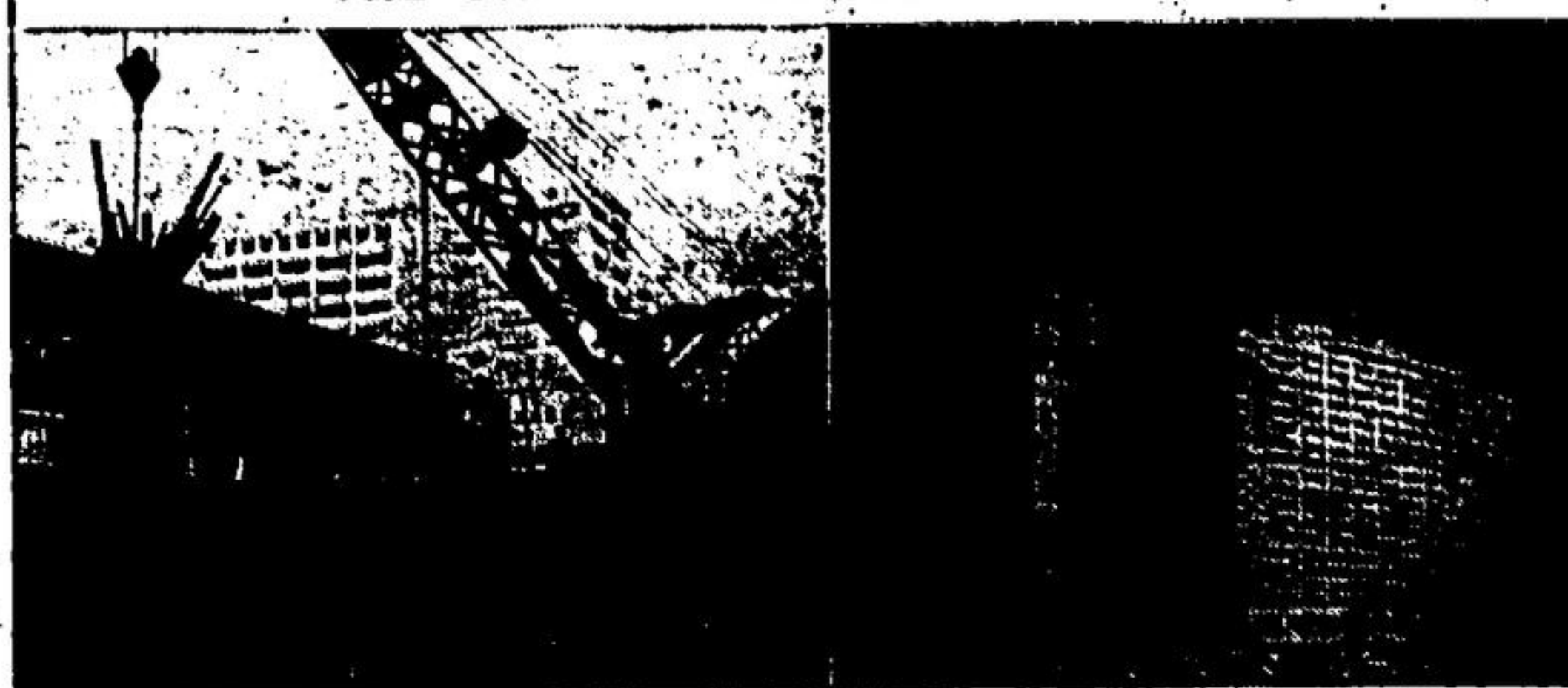

THE SHAPE OF THINGS TO COME



Power cranes, pick, shovels and human muscle went into action recently to clear the way for the construction of the Canadian National Railways new 20-storey hotel in Montreal. The busy scene above, left, shows the demolition of a temporary traffic bridge at the Central Station site. At right is a sketch of what the large hotel, with its more than 1,000 guest rooms, will look like when it is completed in 1957. Between the hotel and the International Aviation Building is a 28-storey office building which the railway proposes to erect. The area is expected to develop through private capital into a magnificent shopping, theatre, office and apartment centre larger than New York's Rockefeller Center.
