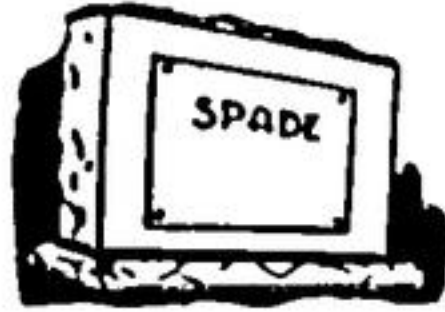
In the evening a concert by Acton Citizens' Band closed the delightful two-day reunion.
