4-H CLUB MEMBERS INSPECT TEST PILOTS

On Tuesday evening July 27th. the Halton 4H Grain and 4H Forage Club members met at the farm of their club leader, Fred Nurse,

Rod row test plots of 8 varieties of oats and 8 varieties of barley were inspected. All varieties have done very well and at present yield tests are being obtained to prove which variety is most suited to Italton. Similar tests are located most counties in Ontario. It was interesting that when asked to name the best variety in the plots almost without exception Beaver was first choice, with 50ncoe and Rodney receiving favour for second Monteulm appeared to be one of the best in the barley plots. Mr. Nurse likes 'Husky,' but the yield results will tell the tale.

The group visited an excellent farm pond which was constructed by damming up a gulley with a new road. It is reported that this pond is the favourite swimming hole now for the Ashgrove com-

munity. After viewing a good field of Reg. Larain Oats and one of the best corn fields seen this year the group listened with interest to Mr. Nurse's comments on the underdrainage which was laid on his farm this spring. Next a visit to the trench silo, which is filled for the second time with grass silage. One of the things noticed was the excellent aftermath on the fields from which this grass stlage was harvested. Milk flow is about normal, whereas on many farms production has taken a sharp drop.
