

Toronto Minister Widely Known for Welfare Work

Minister of Berkeley Street United Church, Toronto for 29 years, Rev. J. Oscar Johnston died Thursday at his home in the city. Mr. Johnston completed 42 years in the active ministry when he retired in June. He was widely known for his welfare work in the Queen and Berkeley districts.

During the depression in the 1930s, his church under his leadership served hot dinners before the Sunday night service to the unemployed.

Born in Queenville, Mr. Johnston was a graduate of Victoria University. After his ordination in the Methodist Church in 1912, he became the pastor at Schumacher, where he established the church. Subsequently he held pastorates in Schreiber, Bruce Mines and Mimico, where he also built a church. In 1952 he went to Berkeley St. United. He was a former chairman of Toronto East Presbytery and chaplain of the Lord Dufferin Old Boys' Association.

He leaves his wife Florence McKenzie Johnston, two sons, Gilbert of Mimico and Dr. Kenneth, St. Catharines, six grandchildren, and four sisters, Mrs. Walter Gray of town, Mrs. Thomas Miller, Queenville, Mrs. George Greenwood and Mrs. F. Sheppard, Toronto. Mr. Johnston often was a visitor in town with his sister and he and his wife accompanied Mr. and Mrs. Gray on a trip to Florida a few years ago.

Three ministers conducted the funeral service on Saturday, Dr. Wesley Hunslett, chairman of Toronto East Presbytery, Dr. Dorsey and Dr. Mustard, and particular tribute was paid to him for his work among people in the lower income brackets who made up a large share of his congregation.

Army Worms Spotted East of Georgetown

Army worm outbreaks have been inspected this week on the 6th Line and Base Line of Trafalgar, and on the No. 7 Highway east of Georgetown. Slight infestations have been noticed in many other fields visited; but damage is not too severe except in three cases. Damage is pretty well confined to green oat fields. Corn fields which are near oat fields should be inspected daily and if any damage is noted poison bait laid down between the two fields. We do not believe army worms hatch in great quantities in corn fields, but rather that they move from ripening grain fields in search of a greener feeding place. Following a survey and spreading of bait is a good practice. At time of writing, the weather is favourable.
