

## Abitibi Company Embarks Pulpwood Research Program

atory established by Abitibi Power and Paper Company Limited 80 miles north of Port Arthur for experiments to increase pulpwood yields was inaugurated by Hon. C. Mapledoram, Minister of Lands and Forests for Ontario. Attending were company representatives, directors of the Port Arthur and Fort William Chamber of Commerce, and delegations from the Canadian Pulp and Paper Association and the Northwestern Ontario Timber Op-

erators' Association. Initial research is being conducted by Abitibl on a "pilot plant" area of 20,000 acres. Properiments, some of which may last many years, include study of soils and sites, thinning and cutting to quicken regeneration through seedlings, and new scientific cutting methods not used elsewhere in Canada on a commercial scale.

In his inauguration speech, the minister said: "In any consideration of the future of forestry in Ontario, regeneration must come first. The opening of this forest research laboratory by the Abitibi Power and Paper Company is another step in the right direction - another indication of the cooperation increasingly evident between government and timber operating organizations.

"Soil and growth studies, improved harvesting, foresters, protection, improvement cutting, utilization of waste by-products, all taken together will not ensure forests to posterity without the guarantee or adequate regeneration in the used forests. . That is the reason for research backed by trained men and laboratory equipment such as you have here. May I on hehalf of my government and my department congratulate you - wish you every success - and a long life in the business of taking perpetual harvests from perpetual forests."

C. B. Davis, vice president (Woodlands), Abitibi Power & Paper Company Limited, presented the Hon. Mr. Mapledoram with a bronze plaque to commemorate inauguration of this research forest. ### Classroom on Wheels For Employee Training

A "Classroom on Wheels" rolled into Toronto for the first time recently. 'The "classroom", actually a mammoth trailer, completely fitted out with personnel training equipment, was designed by Grand Union Carroll's for the purpose of extending its employee training program.

The mission assigned to the "Classroom on Wheels" is that \of travelling throughout the territory encompassed by the 331 Grand Union Food Stores in United States and Canada, and training store employees in the three main categories of dairy, bookkeeping, and checking. In addition, employees will receive thorough training in courtesy and good customer rela-

"We are constantly seeking new ways to improve our already extensive program of personnel training," says L. P. Shield, company president, "We especially want to make that training available to as many of our emloyees as possible. With the 'Classroom on Wheels' in operation, we are now able to train and retrain many more employees than we could in the past. That is simply because the training school is being taken directly to the trai-

Mr. Shields pointed out that the 'Classroom on Wheels' is another of the long list of Grand Union 'Firsts' in the food chain field, taking its place with such other Grand Union innovations as the 'Food-O-Mat' bonded and dated meats, and profit. sharing and stock option plans for

employees. The 'Classroom' is reported to be the first trailer designed especially for a personnel training program, It is 33 feet long and eight feet wide, with an interior height of seven feet. Birchwood panelling, fluorescent lighting and air conditioning make it a comfortable school room for employees to learn the 'three R's' of the food business. The exterior is bright yellow, red and blue and bears the legend: Grand Union Classroom on Wheels - Personnel Training for Friendly

Efficient Service. The trailer carries cash registers, blackboard, motion picture and slide film projection equipment, and all the tools necessary for training checkers, dairy personnel and bookkeepers. Counters used in training checkers can be collapsed into deaks for bookkeeper training. Classes will range in size from four

to ten persons. "We believe our General Training program at Grand Union is second to none," says Lloyd Moseley, personnel director. "It ranges all he way from the University Grad-School

training and includes training centres, division training schools, and a comprehensive menagement train- TRACTOR MEMBERS ing program."

The Grand Union Company has spearheaded formalized undergraduates and graudate training in food distribution. Mr. Moseley was the chairman of the National Association of Food Chains committee which helped to set up courses at Michigan State College leading to the Bachelor's and Master's Degrees in

Food Distribution. Mr. Moseley emphasized that the "Classroom on Wheels" is both a logical outgrowth and an intergral part of Grand Union's general training program. The company conducts a training centre at Pleasantville, NY where advanced training is given in all phases of the company's operation. Each of Grand Union's Divisional Headquarters maintains store training schools which give courses in checking, dairy and produce. In addition, onthe-job training goes on constantly. The 'Classroom' is a supplement to, not a replacement for, this training

Mr. Moseley said. The 'Classroom on Wheels' made its debut in New York City at a special preview for the press and city dignitaries. At that time, it was hailed by Jacob Simonson, principal of the New York Food Trades High School, as "the most important development in food trade education in recent years."

Hall; also Mrs. W. J., Beaty, Acton; R. Licata, Georgetown and A. T. Woodley, Milton was appointed. A meeting will be held at each of the three centres in the near future when local committees will be named. It has been suggested that the courses this year will get under way on Tuesday, November 2nd.
