### Thirteen Ways to Ruin Your Town

The citizens of Perth, Ont. (pop. 5000) have formed an association for the industrial development of their town, certainly one of the most beautiful in Canada and as a start raising a fund of \$75,000 to buy two and a half acres of industrial land and a factory which

stands on it: The Perth Courier has strongly supported the projects but comments editorially in a recent issue that "no space at all has been devoted to suggestions for the reader whole ambition is to do nothing for his community."

The paper then proceeds to list 13 pointers on town planning, "designed especially for the backward citizen," as follows:

1. Don't pay taxes. Let the other fellow pay his. Yote against taxes. Then fuss because the streets are not kept up.

2. Never attend any of the meetings called for the good of the town. Wait until you get outside and then cuss those who made the suggestions. Find fault with evcrything that was done.

3. Get all the town will give you, and don't give anything in return. Write unsigned letters to the editor demanding more for your tax mon-

4. Tulk co-operation, but don't do anything for your town unless you 4. N&G-Moddison (J. Haines) 10.48 get paid for it. And by all means refuse to serve unless you are chair-

> 5. Never accept an office. It's easier to criticize than do things. Accuse anybody who serves in an elected office of being a publicity

> Don't do anything more than you have to. When others willingly and unselfishly give their time to make a better town, howl because that town is run by a clique.

7. Don't back your fire or police departments. If the firemen work to bring the insurance rates down. 11. S'ville-Burton (Brunski) 0.13 tell everybody that is what they 2 27 are supposed to do. 13. And don't support your local retail stores and industries. Claim the prices and services in stores in other towns are better. Claim industry hurts the town. But if you need a donation, ask your tocal stores and industries for it. Expect them to back you, but don't back

If these 13 steps don't ruin your town, it isn't the fault of the backward citizen- At least he can be sure he did his damnedest.

#### WHY DO COWS . LEAVE HOME?

During 1953, Dairy Herd Improvement Association Supervisors made a survey in their respective groups to ascertain the reason for disposal or sale of cows. The summary reveals that 23.4 per cent of . those disposed of were sold because they were low producers; 17.8 per cent left-home because of sterility; 16.7 per cent for dairy purposes; 10.5 per cent because of udder trouble; 9.0 per cent due to Bang's Disease; 7.3 per cent sold for export purposes; 6.3 per cent went because they were low testers; 4.9 had to leave because of injury; 2.9 because of old age; 1:2 per cent were TB reactors. Export sales were abnormally low, because of the effect of the embargo in operation for part of the period.
