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**Norval World Champ Plowman  
Canadian Rep. at Irish Match**

The Esso Golden Plow, symbol of world tractor plowing supremacy, has been shipped from Canada to Eire, in preparation for the second annual world plowing match at Killarney October 8 and 9, J. D. Thomas, president of the World Plowing organization has announced.

Two crack Canadian plowmen including the present world's champion, will sail with their manager from Montreal, Sept. 21 aboard the Express of Scotland, to represent Canada among an expected 15 competing countries.

The Golden Plow was designed and made for the WFO by the world-famous Goldsmiths and Silversmith Co. Ltd. of London, England. It has been on display in Canada under the supervision of the Ontario Plowmen's Association since it was won by a member of the Canadian team. He is James Eccles, 34, of R R 2 Norval a veteran of 20 years match plowing, who outpointed tractor plowmen from Canada and 11 other countries in the first world competition last October at Cobourg, Ont.

His teammates at the match in Ireland will be Robert Timbers, 27, of Stouffville who placed third last year in the world contest just two days after capturing the Canadian title and, with it, the Esso

Silver Plow. William R. Bullock of Camlachie, Ont. will accompany the two Canadian plowmen as team manager and coach.

The three men will travel as guests of Imperial Oil Limited. The National Plough Association of Ireland will be the Canadian and other visiting teams, who will travel more than 500 miles around Eire, observing Irish farming methods and night-seeding, for a week following the match. They will spend a total of 18 days in Eire.

Among the countries that have already entered teams of two plowmen each are Canada, Eire, United States, Great Britain, West Germany, The Netherlands, Finland, Denmark, Sweden, Norway and Pakistan.

The afternoon program was composed of club exhibits, demonstrations and skits. Acton Club presented a demonstration on "Let's Can Tomatoes" with Mrs. Alice Wilkinson and Gail Dobbie as participants. Valerie Nurse and Jessie Alexander of Ashgrove demonstrated "Freezing Fruits and Vegetables." "Let's Can Tomatoes" was also the subject of Dublin's demonstration given by Jean Moffat, Mary McIntyre and Margaret Nightingale, while Hornby girls, Patsy Hamilton and Lynda Hill showed the audience how to Grow a Garden. Skits on "How to Store Vegetables for Winter" by Dawn Coulter, Jean Gundy, Diane Hiscock and Joan Goodale of Lowville and "Let's Grow a Garden" with actors Marie and Muriel Curtis, Heatheranne Hayward, Jacqueline Peacock, Kathleen Peartre and Ruth Robertson of Omagh Club completed the participation of the clubs in the afternoon program.
