The Golden Plow was designed and made for the WPO by the world-famous Goldsmiths and Silvermith Co. Ltd. of London, England. It has been on display in Canada under the supervision of the Ontario Plowmen's Association since it was won by a member of the Canadian team. He is James Eccles, 34, of R R 2 Norval a veterans of 20 years match plowing, who outpointed tractor plowmen from Canada and 11 other countries in the first world competition last Occtober at Cobourg, Ont.

Ireland will be Robert Timbers. 27, of Stouffville who placed third last year in the world contest just two days after capturing the Canadian title and, with it, the Esso
