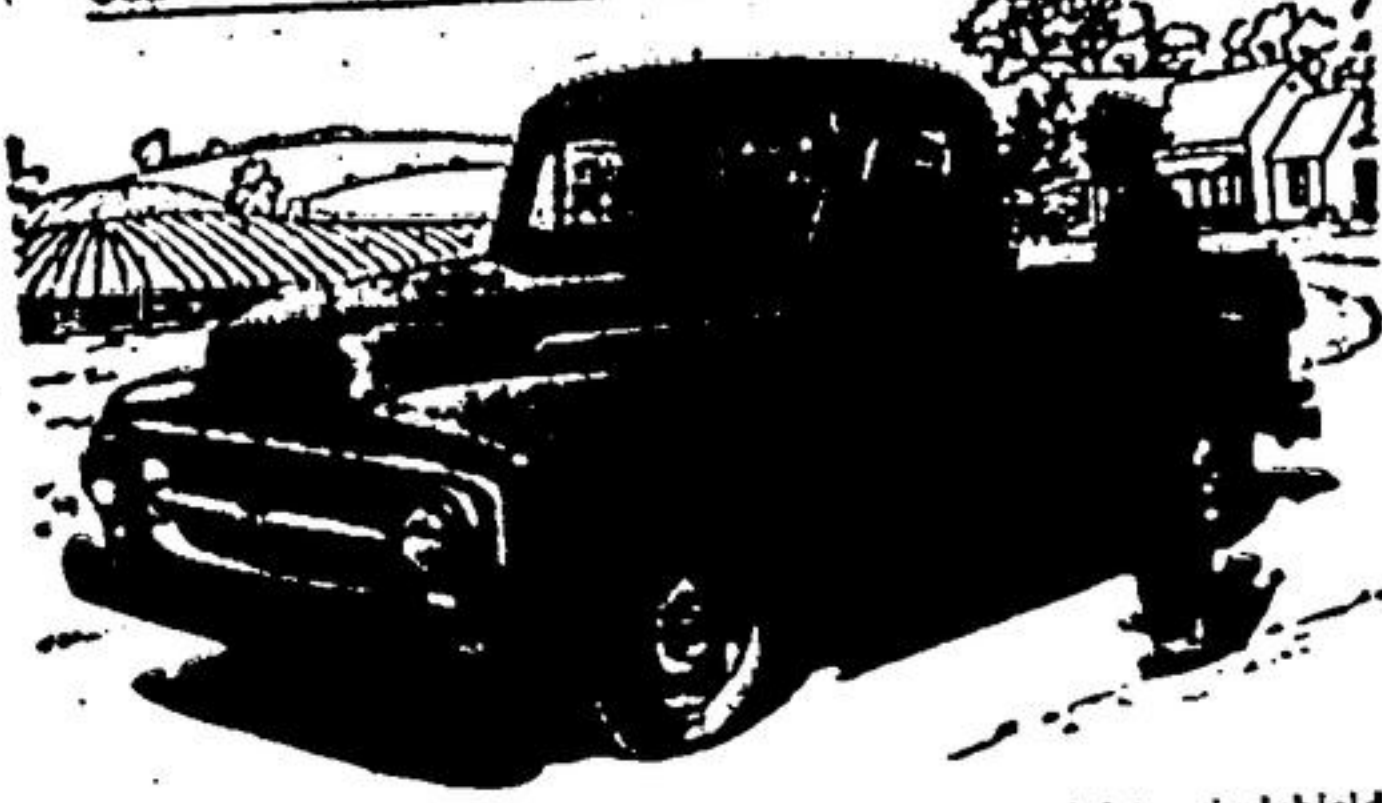

After spending the 1951 season watching the novices of starter Russ Kennedy and absorbing them, Bellon approached Promoters Joe Cappy and Norm Smith for a job at Pinecrest. He was called out of the stands one evening and has been "in" ever since.

"I'll admit I had nightmares after seeing Kennedy get hurt in June," Ron said the other day. "Although he's had his pants nicked on more than a few occasions Bellon still operates with a devil-may-care attitude. He's also become a student of car racing and this year journeyed to Indianapolis for the 500-mile classic and a look at the famous 16th Street track."

"The 16th Street track is similar to Pinecrest in its general layout," Bellon stated, "except that it is some 200 feet longer than a quarter mile. It's also shaped different, shorter straightaways and wider more sweeping highly banked turns."

Keep your eye peeled for Ted and his assistant Eric Robertson. They perform almost as many tricks as the drivers — only they do them without the protection of an all-steel body and a safety belt.
