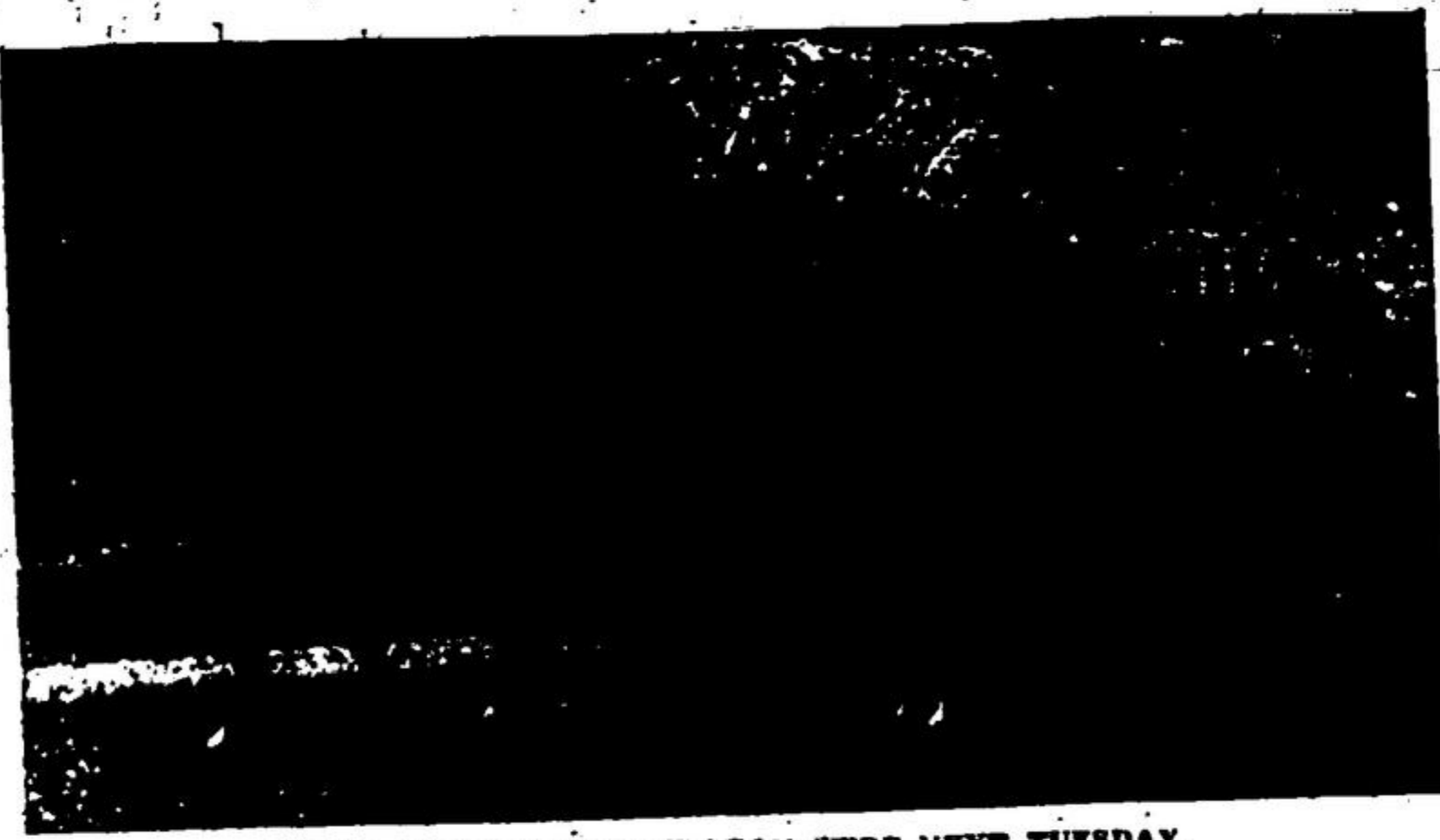


## Mayor Challenged to Plow at International



REPLICA OF CONESTOGA WAGON HERE NEXT TUESDAY.

Mayor Jack Armstrong may be a competitor in the Mayor's Class at the International Plowing Match in Waterloo County in October.

While the mayor has not yet made up his mind to definitely accept a challenge being issued by officials of cities and towns in that county, he is definitely considering it. And with such champion plowmen as Jim Eccles and Hugh Leslie on his doorstep, he has coaches available capable of guiding him to a championship.

The Mayor's match, started as a publicity stunt a few years ago, has become a major feature of the International. The challenge is made this year on behalf of Mayors Donald Weber, Kitchener; William Anderson, Galt; Frank Bauer, Waterloo; Ford Willison, Preston; Elmer Gobel, Hespeler; and Dr. C. E. Gibson, Elmira, all of whom will compete.

On the morning of Tuesday, September 7th, a Conestoga wagon, an exact replica of pioneer days, will appear in downtown Georgetown to deliver the challenge to Mayor Armstrong.

Driven by Bert Lackie with his spanking team of Percheron horses, and accompanied by A. W. Sandrock, chairman of the Waterloo local committee, the Conestoga wagon will carry the challenge on a week long circuit starting at Kitchener, then going to Guelph, Acton, Georgetown, Brampton and will be in

Toronto for Farmers' Day at the C.N.E. On return trip it will visit Oakville, Hamilton, Brantford, Paris, Woodstock, Stratford, London, St. Marys and Ingersoll.

The wagon is an exact replica of the 1807 Conestoga wagon which carried Pennsylvania-Dutch pioneers from Lancaster, Pa., up the famous trail of the Conestoga to Waterloo county. The story is brought to life in the well-known book by Kitchener author H. Mabel Dunham in her book "The Trail of the Conestoga."

Since it was built by old-time Waterloo county craftsmen last year it has been carted all over the province, with the invitation to "see more in '34" at the biggest and best International Plowing Match on the John Randall farm at Breslau.

Arrangements have been made to stable the horses at the W. H. Reid and Son Farm on the Norval Road.
