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

The wagon is an exact replica of the 1807 Conestogs wagon which carried Pennsylvania-Dutch pioneers from Lancaster, Pa., up the famous trail of the Conestoga to Waterloo county. The story is brought to life in the well-known book by Kitchener author B. Mabel Dunham in her book "The Trail of the Conestoga."

Since it was built by old-time Waterloo county craftsmen last year it has been carted all over the province, with the invitation to 'see more in '54' at the biggest and best International Plowing Match on the
