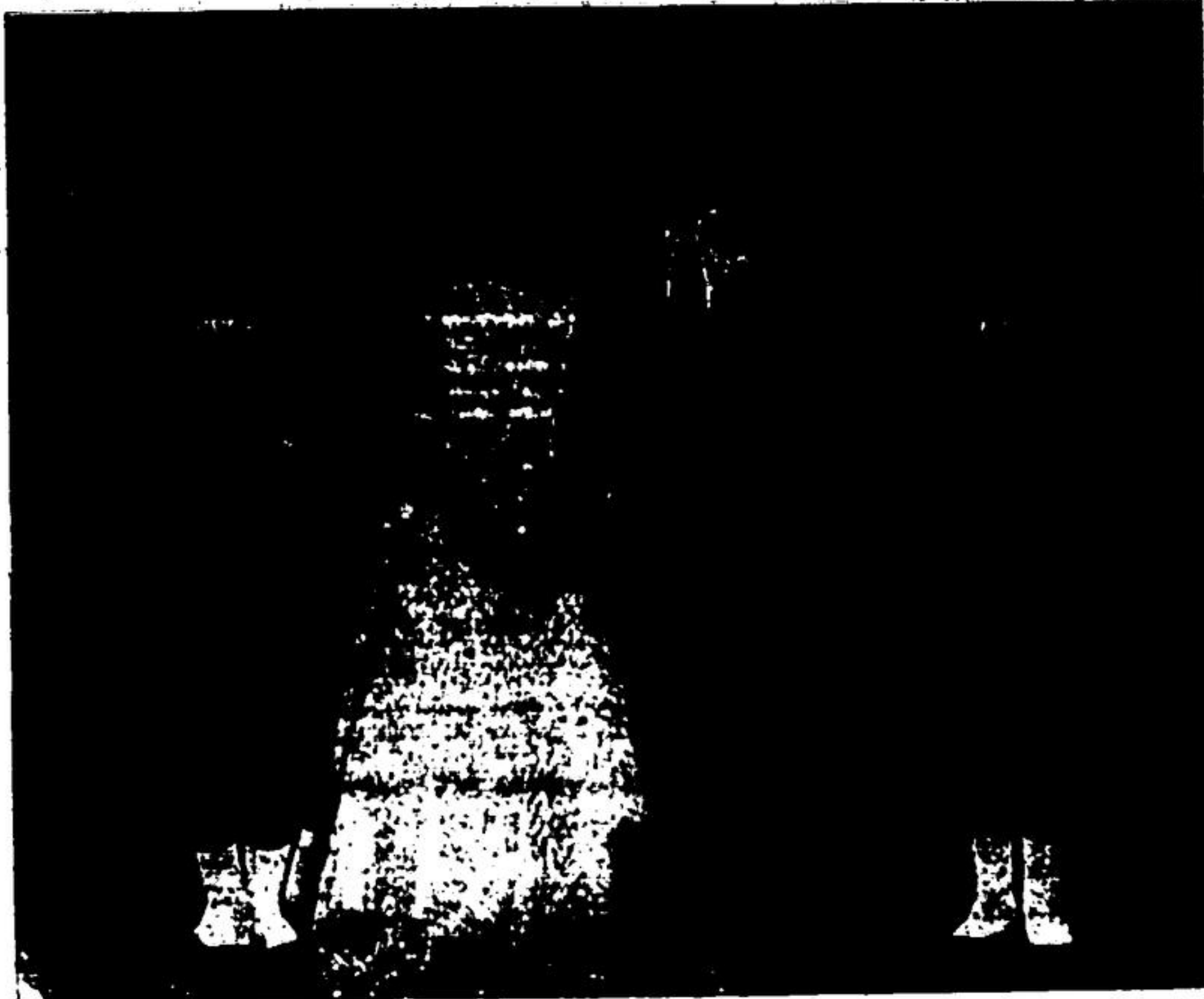

Outclassed by a speedier Sarnia outfit in the OLA Intermediate A playoffs, Georgetown N.G.s. will have their backs to the wall tomorrow when they play the third game here.

N.G.s dropped the first two games of the 3-of-5 series after defeating Streetsville for the right to meet Sarnia. Streetsville, continues in the B playoffs.

One of four bands entered in the Class B section, the Lorne Scots set a record for the CNE when they were given 96 points by the adjudicators for their performance of the best piece Tangon Rouge. They played Sousa's "Under The Double Eagle" as their march.

Favoured to win, Barrie Collegiate Band which took a first prize at the Chicago Music Festival a few weeks ago, was in last place. Burlington Citizens' Band scored 94's, Norwich Musical Society 92; and Harrie 88.

The Lorne Scots previous high mark in competition was 94's.

WHAT COUNCIL DID

Claim OPP Sidestepping Still Seek Speed Trap

Incensed by what one councillor called "side-stepping" by provincial police headquarters, council last night ordered the town clerk to write and ask if the OPP will allow their local detachment to use a speed trap, if one is established here.

A letter read at the meeting, in response to such a previous request, said that investigation showed few serious accidents and no fatalities in town, and it is police opinion that a trap is unnecessary. The department also said that the Dept. of Highways must approve any speed trap.

"That is a pretty weak answer," said Mayor Armstrong. "Do we have to kill a few people off before we can take proper measures to curb speeding?"

"I'm not surprised at all," was Reeve Stan Allen's reaction. "This is the same answer we get from every proposal to the provincials. One inspector told us the main thing is to keep everyone happy and not upset anyone."

The clerk reminded council that the town must first go to the expense of preparing a speed trap before approval can be asked. He was requested to find out if Guelph and Brampton had approval for theirs.

David Bowman was appointed to the Library Board to replace Archdeacon Thompson who resigned when he left town.

A new street light will be placed on Park Ave. between Edith and Market Streets.

Reviewing garage accounts, the town will henceforth deal with one garage each month, taking each in turn in order to ensure a fair split up of business.
