Orangeville's Oldest Resident Dies in Ninety-Eighth Year

Following an illness of a few days duration, Elizabeth Ann Boggs, oldest resident of Orangeville, died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Mabel Watson, Mill Street, with whom she had resided for the past twelve years.

Despite her great age, time had dealt kindly with Mrs. Boggs. Even to those who had known Her well, it was difficult to believe that she was drawing close to the century. mark. Until the moment of her final illness, she remained remarkably active physically, with a mentality that was keenly alert and attentive. Her memory of events of her past life and of dates, was a source of wonder to all who came in contact with her.

Mrs. Boggs was such a cheerful women and was at her happiest when members of the three generations of her family were about her. She thoroughly enjoyed good conversation, daily reading and a game of suctire. This latter pastime she indulged in just a few days before her death. A deeply religious woman, she read her Bible daily, and for the past twenty years had been a conscientious reader of the literature of the Christian Science church.

Mrs. Boggs was born in Georgetown. Her maiden name was Elizabeth Ann Warden and her early life, prior to marriage, was spent in East Garafraxa township.

In 1873 she married Wilson Patterson, the ceremony being performed by the Church of England clergyman at Reading, the Rev. Mr. Cole. Mr. Patterson died in 1886. Of this marriage were born four children: Ed Patterson, of Orangeville, who died two years ago, Wilson of Toronto, Mrs. Mabel Watson, of Orangeville and Mrs. R. J. Mc-Ewan (Lila) also of Orangeville.

In 1889, at Marsville, the widow married Samuel George Boggs. Of this union there were five children, Stanley, of Orangeville, Mrs. Roy Lowry (Eliza) of Guelph, James, of Fergus, Mrs. Henry Nodwell (Edna) of Orangeville, and Mrs. Horace Nodwell (Mercedes), of Guelph.
