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WHAT COUNCIL DID

Council Votes Bullclam For Garbage Disposal

Unless two members of council should change their minds, the Bullclam method of garbage disposal will be adopted in town before the end of this year.

Monday, clerk John D. Kelly was instructed to prepare a by-law to provide the \$11,000 which will be borrowed on debenture to finance purchase of the machine which was demonstrated here this summer and which is reported to have worked so successfully in several cities and towns

The purchase was made only after a brisk council debate which suw Crs. Hale, Lyons and Noble opposed. The three favoured further discussion with Bob Lane, holder of the garbage collection contract to take over the job of disposal as well, using property he owns with a guarantee to buildoze earth over garbage as it is dumped daily.

Mr. Lyons reported that Mr. Lane had said he would do the whole job for an extra \$3,000 yearly over his present contract. Other councillors argued that the extra money could be better spent on the bullclam machine, though Mr. Noble warned that he did not believe the company's claim that it would take only a few hours a day for bullclam operation, and he thinks a man will be employed full time at this job.

Mr. Lyons proposed that garbage collection should be paid the same as water rates, with separate bills to each householder, but was told that this could not be enforced and it would lead to people dumping garbage all over town,

filled land couldn't be built on, but Deputy Reeve Norton said the old Guelph dump is now the site of a housing subdivision.

"We've all kinds of evidence to show the bullclam successful, but not a shred to show that an open dump meets with approval," said Reeve Allen in moving to buy the machine.

"The daily papers tell us every night of open dump troubles," said Cr. Sargent, who seconded the mot-

Mayor Armstrong enviraged filling waste land in town such as the area behind the arena, while Mr. Norton said he thought the machine could work for 15 or 20 years reclaiming Central Park for some museful purpose. Mr. Lyons reported that people in Brampton hadn't been too satisfied with their recent bullclam purchase, and that he didn't think it would be economical for a town as small as Georgetown to use this method.

Two Opposed as Council Renews Police Contract

With two councillors voting in opposition, council on Monday decided to renew the contract for policing by Provincial Police which ter-

minates the end of the year. Reeve Stan Allen led the opposition, saying that while he had nothing personally against the constables stationed here, he does not fayour a system which gives council no control over policing. He is particularly bitter against the OPP attitude to catching speeding motorists, and would favour having municipal police who could act on council's orders in such matters.

Cr. Garfield McGilvray renewed a plea that council ask OPP headquarters to consider maintaining the present 3-man force, rather than adding an extra man next year as they plan. Previously no one had agreed with him, but this time Cr. Doug Sargent sided in with the finance minister. Other councillors felt that if OPP is wanted, their

decisions should not be questioned. The mayor and clerk were authorized to sign the new agreement. Cr. Harry Hale voted with the reeve

against the move.
