

## Reeve Tries Again **But Provincials Stay**

In a final bid to have council consider re-establishing a strictly local police force, Reeve Stan Allen was supported only by Cr. Harry Hale at Monday's meeting.

The reeve spoke to a by-law, passed with the two dissenting votes, authorizing mayor and clerk to sign the agreement which will boost the local OPP detachment from three to four men in January. Reiterating his previously voiced opinion, Mr. Allen usaid he has no quarrel with the individual officers themselves, but he can't see policing over which council has no control and which can't be moulded to suit local needs.

"Seeing so few towns with provincials makes me wonder why others use their own force," said the reeve. "I was in a town of 3,000" yesterday where the police chief near-gale proportions, caused damgets \$3600 and constables start at \$2600 with \$100 yearly raises.
