WHAT COUNCIL DID

With Cr. G. McGillvray pressing strongly for some definite action on resurfacing No. 7 Highway through town, council by a split vote Monday night ordered a by-law prepared and a letter sent to the highways department urging immediate action.

"We've kicked this around for two or three years," said Mr. McGillvray in presenting a motion which Mayor Armstrong opposed. "Let's at least get the surfacing done and the storm sewers and curbs can be tackled another year."

Mayor Armstrong opposed half measures, saying that solution for a drainage problem at the foot of the hill which flooded the Halton Co-Op mill consistently is of equal importance, and that this should be remedied at the same time. He had strong support from Deputy Reeve Norton who fears that unless gutters and curbs are done at the same time, the new highway surface will not stand up.

"I'm in favour of gutters too," said Mr. McGillvray "but we won't get that done this year and there is a possibility we might be able to complete the surfacing."

Council has abandoned any idea of widening the existing 100' road which has been suggested by highway officials. There would be heavy extra cost in moving hydro poles and repairing sidewalks. Several councillors agreed with the mayor that it is foolish to widen through town when the highway narrows on either side.

Recording the vote on resurfacing, Allen, Hale, Lyons and Noble supported the motion. Gray, Norton, Sargent and the mayor were opposed.

Action on buying a Bullclam for garbage disposal has been postponed.

Deputy Reeve Norton has been in touch with owner of a dump site at Dolly Varden being used by the township, available at a small yearly rental, and council will discuss with Bob Lane, who holds the collection contract, prices on hauling to this dump which is located less than five miles from town.

Replacing of municipal collection by a private system such as in Brampton was suggested by Cr. Thomas Lyons, but met with little favour. The mayor pointed out that this would be a backward step and that council would then have no control either over dump sites or fees.

The deputy reeve said rates for private collection would certainly be higher because when it is paid in the tax rate, home owners are heavily subsidized by tax money received from industry and large landowners.

McGilvray Pushes for Highway Resurfacing

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WHAT COUNCIL DID

Reeve Tries Again But Provincials Stay

In a final bid to have council consider re-establishing a strictly local police force, Reeve Stan Allen was supported only by Cr. Harry Hale at Monday's meeting.

The reeve spoke to a by-law, passed with the two dissenting votes, authorizing mayor and clerk to sign the agreement which will boost the local OPP detachment from three to four men in January. Reiterating his previously voiced opinion, Mr. Allen said he has no quarrel with the individual officers themselves, but he can't see policing over which council has no control and which can't be moulded to suit local needs.

"Seeing so few towns with provincials makes me wonder why others use their own force," said the reeve. "It was in a town of 3,000 yesterday where the police chief gets \$3800 and constables start at \$2600 with \$100 yearly raises. This compared with \$4100 which an OPP corporal will get next year and the three constables \$3480. Our police don't cope with traffic problems. In my three years on council, the police committee has been merely a group which can take complaints to the police, but can't direct them.

Norton — I have the opposite view. I like OPP because we haven't control over them. We'd be overrun with suggestions if we had our own police.

Gray — I've all the respect in the world for the reeve's opinion, but as police chairman I don't see that policing would be better if we would police to suit the town. It's a pleasure to live in a crime-free town where our only troubles are petty ones.

McGilvray — We're getting fairly satisfactory policing with the least possible effort on council's part.

Allen — If that's the case, we should hire a town manager and have no worries at all. We should expect to have worries when we seek council office. The OPP men are tied to town and don't have the freedom of leaving town that local police would have.

Mayor — The only reason they don't go out of town is that council

In the past instructed them to keep in town limits.

Allen — We should at least allow them to chase speeders outside town limits.

Noble — They do. I've seen them. Mayor — Certainly I'm in favour of allowing them to chase speeders when the offence occurs within town limits.

Windstorm Keeps Hydro Crew Working Last Night

Superintendent G. W. McCallum and his hydro crew had a particularly busy time yesterday.

It started when a transformer cut out blew in the waterworks building at supper time. Later in the evening, high winds which reached near-gale proportions, caused damage in two parts of town. About one in the morning, a tree blew down on Guelph Street, falling across Ern Thompson's house where it knocked down a television aerial. The falling tree also blew a fuse which controls all the town's street lighting.

On Academy Road near the Smith and Stone plant, hydro lines became tangled with tree branches which caught fire. A line also fell on a car but there was no damage to the vehicle.

FIREMEN CALLED WHEN BOYS LOST IN BUSH

Services of the fire brigade were asked early this afternoon to locate two small boys who were lost in the bush behind Churchill Crescent.

The fire alarm was sounded shortly after one o'clock and the story had a happy ending when the boys were located some time later, deep in the bush where they had wandered near the old reservoir.

Four children survive, John of Georgetown; George, Annie, (Mrs. Howard Barker) and Queenie (Mrs. Robert Croll) of Oakville; and a brother Ernest in Pennsylvania. An only sister Mrs. Minnie Hansauid died in Detroit in February. There are seven grandchildren.

Interment in Oakville Cemetery on Saturday followed the funeral service at the S. S. Russell & Son Funeral Home there.
