TWO GEORGETOWN SCHOOLS NEAR ENROLMENT OF 700

With almost 700 children enrolled in the two public schools, Georgetown is hard put this year to take care of a snowballing enrolment which has filled the schools to more than capacity.

A new 4-room addition at Wrigglesworth School is under way and until this is ready, the school auditorium is being used for classes, and a mixed Grade 4 and 5 class under the direction of Miss Hazel

Hall is temporarily housed in the music room of Chapel School.

Total enrolment at present is 691 in the two schools. Chapel Street has 380 and Wrigglesworth 322 and the new school has a Grade 8 class of local pupils for the first time. Total Grade 8 enrolment this year is 58, and kindergarten-primary has 103, forecasting more accommodation problems for the school board in future years.

Eighteen men and women share teaching duties at the schools.

At the 10-teacher Chapel School, two newcomers have joined the staff. Miss Thelma Whale, Grade 1, from Drayton Public School staff replaces Mrs. Walter Sargeni, now in South Peel. Mrs. Teresa Austin, Grade 2, who formerly taught at S. S. No. 10, Erin, replaces Miss Laura Stott, who retired in June.

The other staff members are Mrs. Joe Dwyer, K-P; Marie Lindsay, Grade 1-2; Mrs. H. C. Wrigglesworth, Grade 3; Val Stein, Grade 4; Wilma Stull, Grade 5; Mrs. James F. Evans, Grades 5-6; Luena Campbell, Grade 7; and Principal Harold Henry, Grade 8.

Wrigglesworth School staff is increase by two this year. Miss Hazel Hall, who teaches Grades 4-5 taught at Milton Heights last year. Miss Edna Moffat, Grades 1-2 comes to the school from a position last year at USS 17, East Wawa and Morris.

Other members of the staff are Mrs. Harold Henry, K-P; Jean Rudell, Grade 1, Mrs. Ted Fenning, Grade 2, Mrs. Frank Cleave, Grade 3; Marion Scarlett, Grades 5-6; Principal William Kinrade, Grades 7-8. The caretakers, Arthur Herbert of Chapel Street and Sol Dewhurst,

Wrigglesworth, had buildings in fine condition for school opening. At Chapel Street improvements made during the summer included painting of two classrooms, replacing the old walk in front of the school with a new and wider one, installation of a staff washroom and new central heating system.

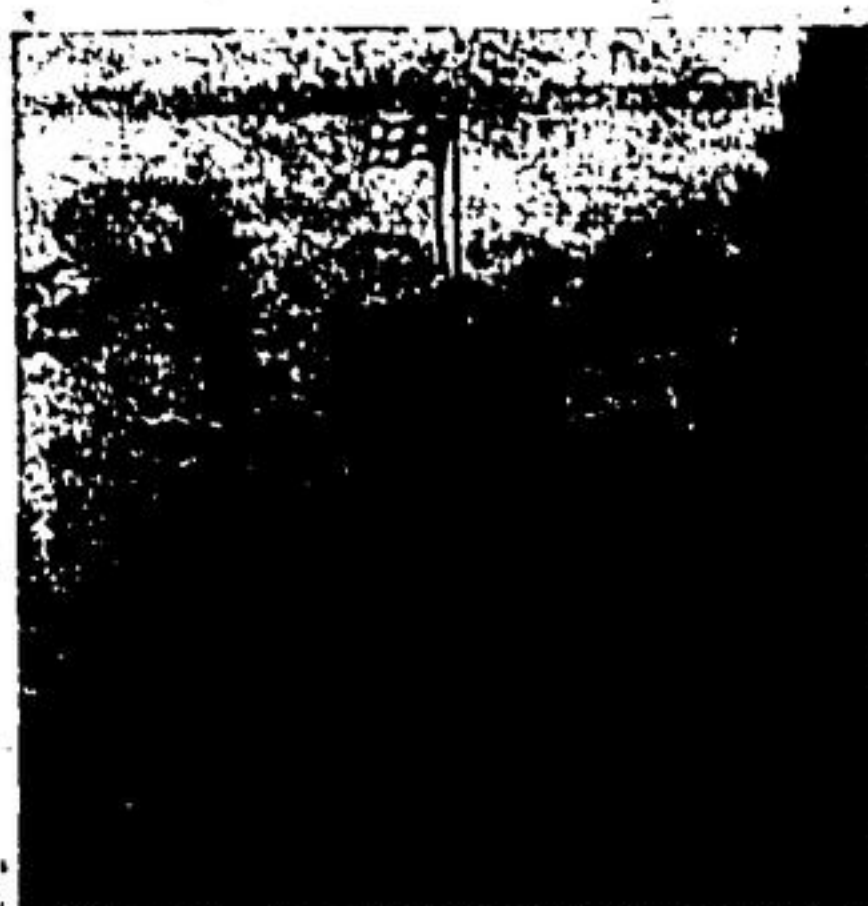
