Prof. R. G. Knox, head of the department of animal husbandry at the Ontario College of Agriculture since 1936 will retire October 6th. Widely known for his livestock

research finding, Prof. Knox will be succeeded by Prof. George Raithby, a senior professor in the department for several years.

Prof. Knox gained wide recognition for his pioneer effort in drawing up the country's first artificial insemination program in 1938. Under his leadership, too, the Arkell Farm at OAC was established for livestock research.



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Ask Township Approval Pool 3 Phone Exchanges

Representatives of Esquesing and Nassageweya townships met with members of the North Halton Urban Board in Milton last week to consider the suggested extension of telephone service by an amalgamation of the Milton, Acton and Geor-

getown exchanges. Chairman Jack Armstrong explained to Walter Linham for Esquesing and Arthur Service for Nassagaweya that the urban municipalities had already favoured the taking of a poll vote among subscribers to determine their read-

It was further explained that before the new plan of extended service could be put into effect an 85 per cent majority of the subscribers must favour the move.

The extended service would increase the rates approximately 29 cents per month on private lines, according to official Bell estimates. Back of the thinking of members of the Hoard in promoting the idea was the greater case in ringing through fire slarms, police calls and other emergency services

Extension of the service would eliminate toll charges between any of these three centres, . It was explained. Township representatives agreed to present the matter to their councils and receive resolutions favouring the vote if the coun-

cils were agreeable. The Board secretary, J. McGeachie, was instructed to investigate and determine whether the 85 per cent majority was of votes cast or of total subscribers.

Information on the amssibility of having a booth at the Trade Fair to promote North Halton industrially was presented. A minimum size area would be 10 feet by 12 feet at \$2.50 a square foot. The preparation of the booth would be considered additional expense. The matter was to be considered further when more information was available and the financial situation of the board was

James Dills, representing the Dills Printing and Publishing Co., submitted suggestions and prices on the preparation of a promotional brochure embodying a detailed map of the North Halton area and other necesary information, as requested by the Board A committee was to meet at the next meeting to consider the information that should be included in the folder.

Councillor Doug Sargeift, Georgetown, suggested members should consider an interchange of information on industrial sites available so that if one town was unable to satisfy an investigating industrialist, the facilities of one-of the other North Halton towns could be offered. This plan was endorsed as members pointed out the value to the area as a whole to have the effects of the industry in North Halton.

CCF Picnicers Hear Former Ontario MPP

Those attending the Halton CCF Association picnic on September 11, heard speeches by William Temple, Torento, a former member of the Ontario legislature and Stan Allen, Georgetown, CCF candidate in the

The annual pienic was held at The Breezes, an attractive pienic and just west of Acton. There was baseball, races for the children and a pienie supper.

Mr. Temple, who defeated George Drew to win a seat in the legislature in 1948 said that main problems today are unemployment and the periodic failure of our economic system. If these problems are ever to be solved, he said, it is necessary to elect men like Stan Allen, representing a party like the CCF, in sufficient numbers to become the government of the province and of

the country. Mr. Allen stated that this winter will expose the kind of government Ontario has been putting up with for the last few years. He feels that unemployment during the coming season will be worse than it has been since depression days. . The farmer, he said, is paying more for goods and getting less for his produce than at any time since the war. In the face of these problems, the government has showed a deplorable lack of policy.

It is time that a government is placed in power whose policies are formulated at conventions by the ordinary people of the province, anid Mr. Allen.

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
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
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
