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Firemen Ask Co-operation

The approach of Fire Prevention Week gives householders and businessmen an opportunity to take stock and make sure there aren't any unnecessary hazards which could lead to loss of life and property.

Carelessness is a human trait and fires are not caused by conscious acts, but rather by not doing little things we never got around to.

A dirty furnace and clogged chimney is one of the commonest fire causes. Clean them out before you start up your furnace for the winter. That accumulation of junk which piled up in the cellar or in a corner of the yard during the summer is a potential fire menace.

Too many packing boxes and inflammable excelsior piled up in a store's stockroom can be dangerous.

And particularly at this time of year, be careful about lighting bonfires when you are raking leaves. Light a fire only when the wind is low, and make sure you don't leave it unattended and that it is not smouldering through the night.

Members of the local fire department will be inspecting business premises during Fire Prevention Week. Any suggestions they make will be for your own protection. Remember this, and receive advice in the spirit in which it is given.

An Idea for Merchants

Georgetown is growing so rapidly that anyone in business must have the same troubles as the Herald editor in keeping up with the times.

A few years back we tried to welcome all the new residents with an item in the paper about them. Now new subdivisions are filling up so fast that our best efforts only account for a fraction of this reporting, and try as we might, we miss news of this nature many times.

As a Main Street businessman, we do not deal directly with the public the way a grocer, a clothier or a jeweller does, but we are part of the business fraternity and naturally interested in its welfare. And we are interested in assimilating newcomers into Georgetown as

It is simply to get together as a group and welcome new residents by making them feel we are friendly.

The idea, briefly, is to have someone call on a new housewife, presenting a welcome from merchants with a number of small gifts, credit certificates and an invitation to visit the local stores and shop in their friendly atmosphere.

Night School Expanded

After a successful start last year with Georgetown night school classes, the program has been considerably expanded this fall.

An advertisement in this issue tells of the courses which will be available both locally and at Acton and Milton. It is particularly important that those interested use the application form contained in the advertisement, for no separate forms are being printed as in other years.

It should also be noted that it is possible for a person to register in courses offered locally, or in courses not being held here but

which are available in other towns. Limitations will have to be made, of course, and early applications stand the best chance of acceptance.

The shift to classes in the three towns was made last year, after several years of successful schools in Milton which were attended by many local people. Georgetown and Acton residents, who found it difficult to travel in the winter months, can thank the Arts and Crafts organization who were instrumental in having the night school expanded to embrace the three towns.

**FIRE PREVENTION
WEEK
IN GEORGETOWN
October 3 to 9**

In accordance with a national proclamation, residents are asked to cooperate with the following recommendations during this week.

1. All dwellings, public buildings, stores, warehouses, factories, farms, mines and forests be carefully inspected by their occupants and all conditions likely to cause or promote the spread of fire be removed.
2. All theatres, hotels, hospitals and other institutional buildings be inspected and provisions made for all changes necessary to protect the occupants in case of fire.
3. Fire drills be held for the children in all schools, for the inmates of all institutions and for the employees in all factories, in order that a greater degree of safety be ensured by acquainting the occupants with the best and most expeditious mode of exit in time of danger.
4. Special instruction on the subject of fire prevention be given by the teachers and by municipal officials in the schools and that such appropriate literature as may be made available be distributed to the pupils.
5. Federal, Provincial and Municipal authorities endeavour, by means of public meetings, the press, radio broadcasts, specially prepared motion pictures or otherwise as may to them seem most fit, to impress upon the citizens the national importance of protecting life, property and natural resources from loss by fire.
