

**Local Improvement Notice**

**Take Notice That:**  
 1. The Council of the Corporation of Georgetown intends to construct a sidewalk on Guelph Street from Wrigglesworth School to Maple Avenue as a Local Improvement and intends to specially assess a part of the cost upon the land abutting directly on the work.  
 2. The estimated cost of the work is \$1,428.44, of which \$952.29 is to be paid by the Corporation, and the estimated cost per front foot is \$2.38. The special assessment is to be paid in 10 annual instalments.  
 3. Persons desiring to petition against undertaking the work must do so on or before the 20th day of October, 1954.

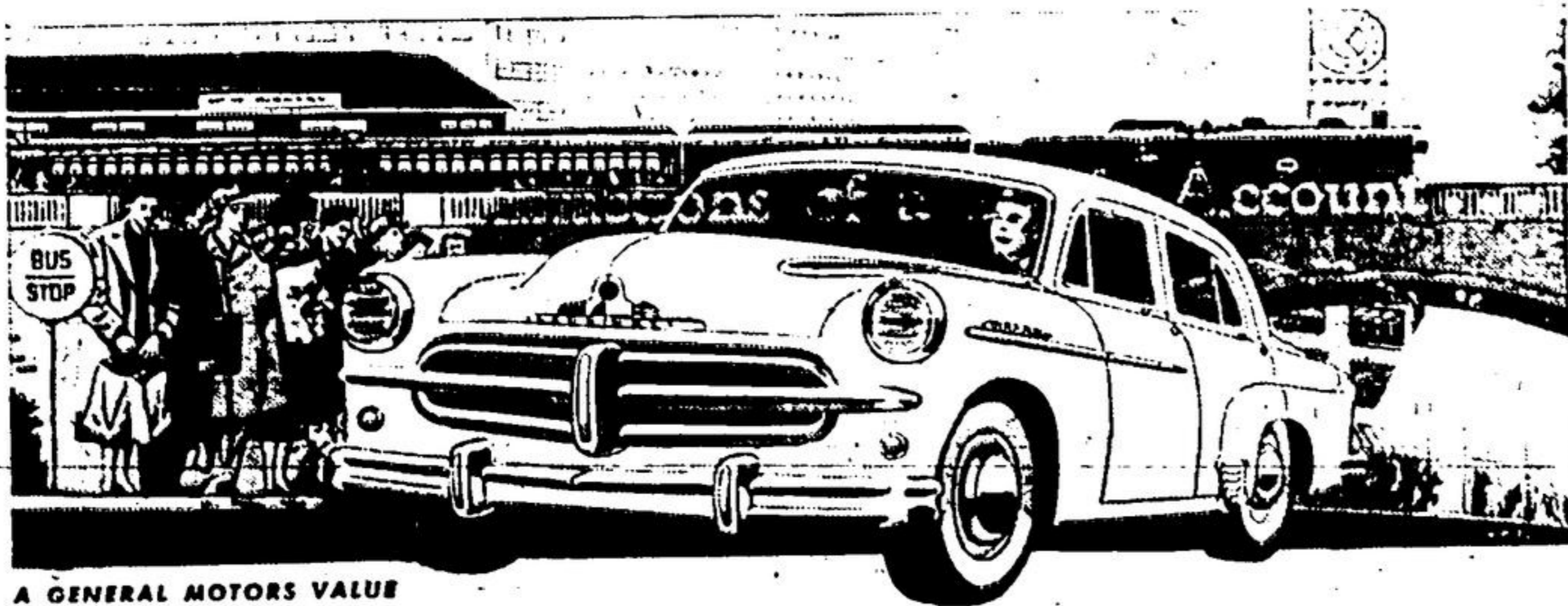
Miss Barbara Knight sailed for her home in Felstead, Essex last week, after visiting in the Georgetown area for three months.

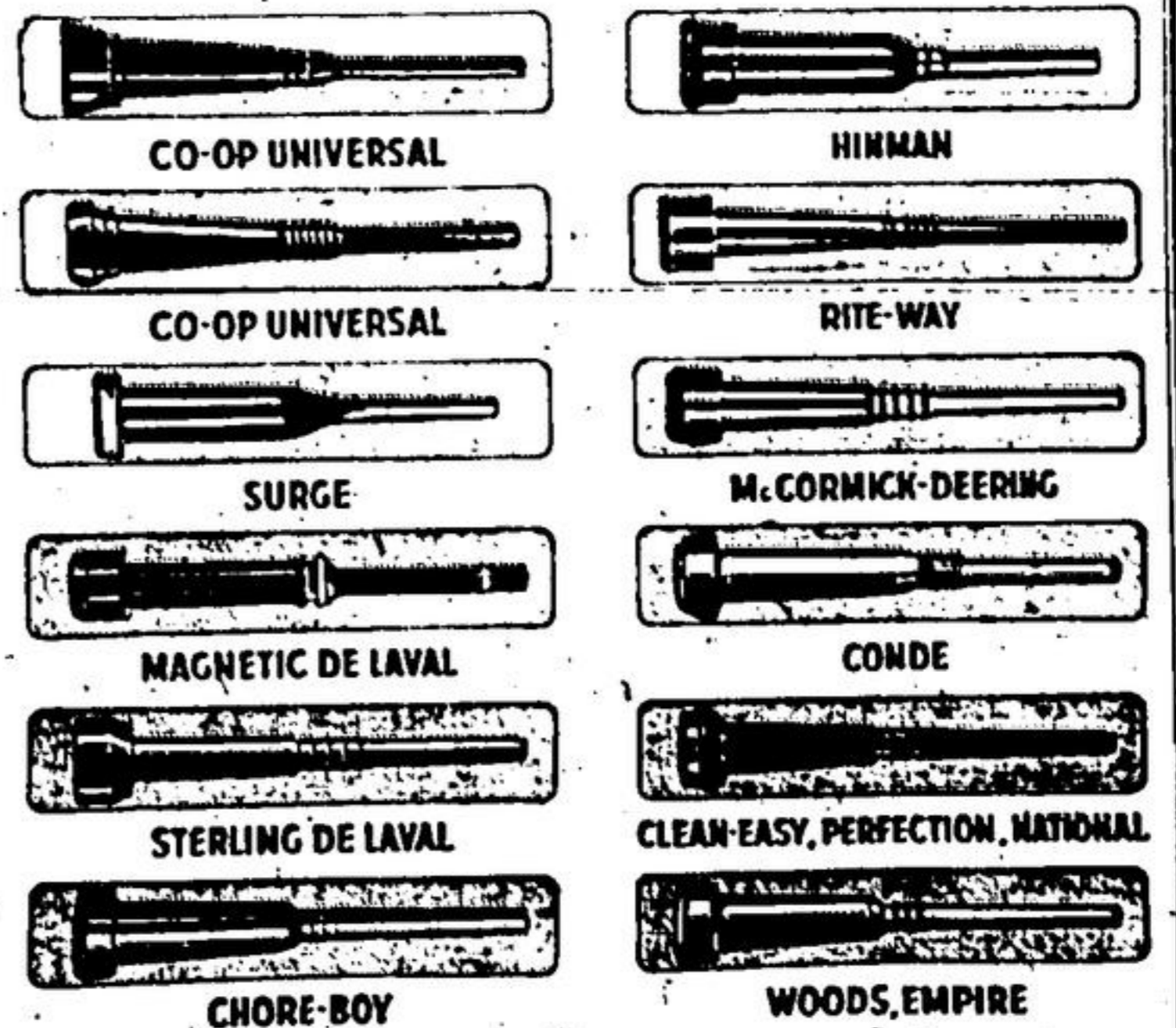
